FIFTH REVERSE FOR PHILS

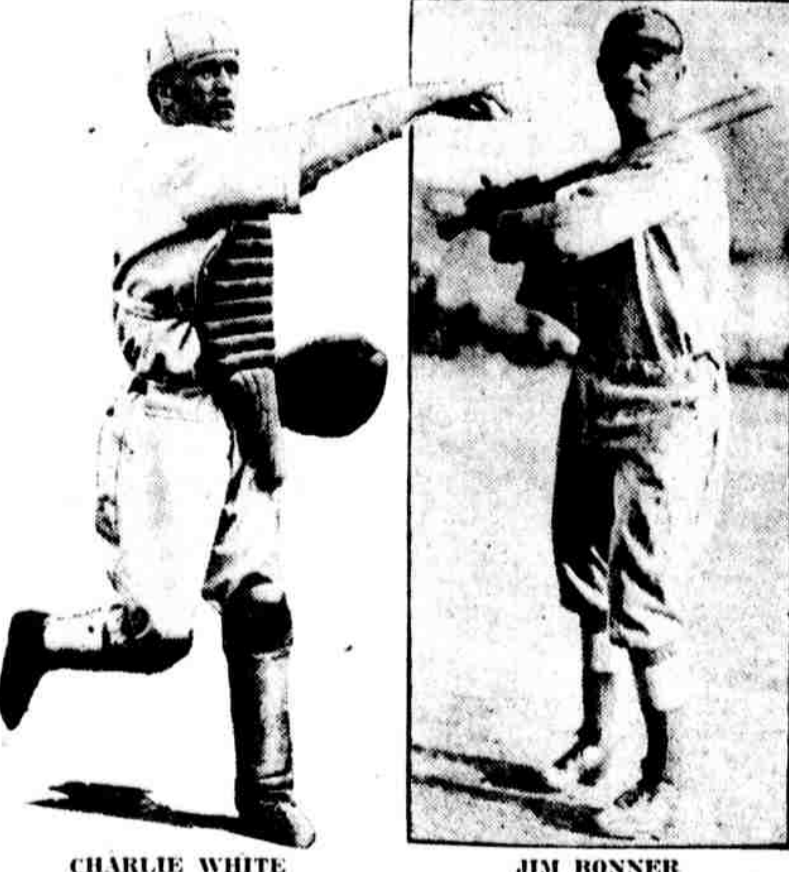
The Phillies aren't the only ones in the National League that are sliding down the ladder like lightning. They have rivals wearing the uniforms of the New York Giants, world's champions last season.

WHITNEY TWIRLS GTN. H. S. TO TITLE

Allows Episcopal Two Hits in City Scholastic Championship Game

COLESBERRY NEW CAPTAIN

By PAUL PREP GERMANTOWN HIGH SCHOOL is the scholastic baseball champion of Philadelphia for the season of 1922.

The Clivedens won the title by defeating Episcopal Academy, champion of the Interacademic League for the last two seasons, on Northeast Field, Twenty-ninth and Clearfield streets, yesterday afternoon, 11 to 2.

Donald Whitney, king of schoolboy speed twirlers, was the hero of the Green and White's victory over the Churchmen. Supported in admirable style by his teammates, Whitney allowed the Blue and White aggregation but two hits during the game. He fanned seven batters and issued one base on balls.

Long, the best twirler in the "Inter-ac" ranks this season, was the loser. In spite of the lopsided score, he pitched a great game, errors and "boners" helping considerably in his defeat. Long allowed thirteen hits.

At the start it looked as though Episcopal might come through with a victory. The Churchmen retired the Clivedens in order, and then took their turn at the bat. Coleberry was walked. Kinder sacrificed him to second. Rittenhouse, who was playing first, having swapped positions with Captain Kraft, who was stationed at short, fanned.

Kraft came to the platter and singled, and Coleberry crossed the plate. It was Kraft's last hit while wearing the uniform of Episcopal. He will be graduated from the school in June.

Robert Coleberry, who scored the first run, will be back at the school next year. What's more, he will be captain of the Overbrook nine. He was unanimously elected after the game.

Later on O'Meara made another wild throw. This was in the sixth inning, when he threw the ball over first after holding Brockman's hunt perfectly. He was taken out at the end of the sixth to make way for Pryor.
