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RAILROAD REMOVES BOARDWALK SIGN. Pennsylvania Officials, Although Granted Official Sanction, Decide to Avoid Suit.

BLACK TO APPEAL AGAIN. Atlantic City, June 7. — Possible court action to decide the right of the Pennsylvania Railroad to erect a big electric sign on the ocean side of the Boardwalk, atop a big pavilion, was made unnecessary yesterday by removal of the sign.

There was a misunderstanding and the officer did what he felt was his duty. The case will be heard by the Supreme Court clerk, yesterday, Mr. Johnson, who is the recognized Republican Organization leader in the county, was arrested Tuesday night by Traffic Policeman "Steve" Devlin for violating traffic signals. The incident occurred at Tennessee and Atlantic avenues, in the shadow of the City Hall.

Armed with Federal warrants issued by John Izard, United States Commissioner, State director of the Federal dry agents, assisted by two agents, raided four alleged "blind tiger" saloons. The alleged proprietors were arrested and a quantity of liquor said to have an alcoholic content in excess of that stipulated by the Volstead act was confiscated.

Two Encampment Dates Changed. Harrisburg, June 8.—The dates for encampments of two artillery regiments were changed yesterday by Adjutant General Frank D. Beary, at request of colonels. The Nineteenth will camp at Tobyhanna August 5 to 19, and the 107th from August 19 to September 2.

Henry Mantrik Contest Begins. Pittsburgh, June 8.—The Allegheny County Commissioners met yesterday to investigate the contest between J. M. Henry and Dr. L. K. Mantrik for the Democratic nomination for Congress in the Thirty-fifth District. Official returns gave the nomination to Henry, but the count showed Mantrik the winner.

"GOOD HUNTING" IN PHILA. FOR SPOUSE-SEEKING GIRLS. Census Returns Show Plenty of Eligible Young Males for All "Bachelor Girls" Here—Plenty of "Merry Widows," Too.

By a Staff Correspondent. Washington, June 7.—For every old maid a husband! For every old bachelor—bald-headed or otherwise—a wife! That goes for Philadelphia, according to the 1920 census. When the census enumerators took notes on the city's population, they did a thorough job of it. Their reports disclose that in Philadelphia, unlike many cities, the population of single males exceeds the population of single females at about the line, making it theoretically easier for a bachelor girl to find a husband than for a bachelor to find a wife. Here are some of the other disclosures: That almost a third of all the girls and women of the city over fifteen years are unmarried. That more than a third of the men over that age are unmarried. That married life is apparently harder on the husband than it is on the wife, seeing that the widows outnumber the widowers more than two-to-one. That the number of "merry widows"—i. e., divorcees—exceeds the number of divorced widowers. Despite all this, however, the reports still showed that more than half of the city's population of marriageable age is married—whether happily is not stated. Commenting on the figures, the Census Bureau observes that in the earlier years of adult life the proportion of married is much larger for females than for males, but that after the age of forty-five is reached the proportion of married men exceeds that of married women—73.8 per cent as against 62.7 per cent. "The obvious explanation," the bureau concludes, "is that women marry at a younger age than men." Philadelphia's total population is 1,823,779, as recorded by the census, comprised 656,830 males fifteen years of age or older, of whom 288,783 or 44.1 per cent were married; and 667,074 females above the same age minimum, of whom 378,067 or 56 per cent were married.

CAMDEN ROSE FETE OPENS AT HOSPITAL. 400 Women of the County Aid in Chief Social Event of the Season.

Nearly 400 Camden County women comprise the committee which are actively interested in the annual Rose Fete, which opened in Camden this morning and the proceeds of which will be turned over to the West Jersey Homeopathic Hospital. The fete is one of the brilliant social events of the season in Camden and will continue until Saturday evening.

The affair is being conducted by the Ladies' Auxiliary of the hospital, and the aid of many women prominent in South Jersey social circles has been enlisted. The fete is being held on the spacious lawn of the hospital.

Three of South Jersey's bands have volunteered their services for the occasion. Cyrus Commandery Band, Camden, will play this evening, while the Griffenberg Band, of Riverton, will be in attendance tomorrow night. The Lyric Band, of Camden, will play Saturday night.

U. S. ARMY CONCENTRATES ITS FIELD SCHOOL PLANTS. Artillery Base to Be at Fort Sill and Air School in Texas.

Washington, June 8.—Decision to concentrate all field artillery schools at Fort Sill, Okla., was announced yesterday by Secretary Weeks, who approved that feature of the report of a board of officers recently appointed to study the army school system and make recommendations for elimination of duplication in the courses and a reduction of administrative costs.

Under the new orders the artillery officers' "basic school" at Camp Meade, Ky., and the artillery field officers' school at Camp Bragg, North Carolina, will go to Fort Sill, where schools for battery officers and enlisted specialists already are located.
