TEMPEST KILLS 60 AT NEW YORK; 40 ARE DROWNED

Occupants Swept to Death as Boats in Long Island Sound Overturn

CRASH OF FERRIS WHEEL SNAFFS OUT SEVEN LIVES

Millions in Damage When Violent Storm Roars Through Five States

TIDE WASHES IN 18 BODIES

Victims Largely Persons Seeking Relief From Intense Heat

Saves Drowning Fiancee at Cost of His Own Life

Greenwich, Conn., June 12.—(By A. P.)—John Anderson, of the Bronx, heroically rescued his fiancée, Gladys Redinger, when their canoe was upset in Long Island Sound during the storm yesterday, and sacrificed his own life. When the frail craft overturned Anderson swam with the girl until he reached the boat and helped her to gain a hold on it.

Just as a rescuing yacht sailed up Anderson's strength gave way, his hold on the canoe failed and the exhausted man sank. The girl was taken aboard the yacht.

New York, June 12.—The death toll of the brief but terrific hurricane that swept down on the Metropolitan area yesterday passed the sixty mark today with indications that the total number of dead might go much higher.

The death list leaped ahead when an incoming tide returned eighteen more bodies that had been swept out to sea last night. Four more bodies were recovered at Hunters Island and two were reported to have been picked up at Travers Island.

City Island, haven for Sunday pleasure-seekers and amateur fishermen—was the hardest hit point in the Metropolitan area but casualties mostly by drowning were reported from many other points.

The beach at City Island today presented a desolate spectacle. Several hundred persons—relatives of the missing—were hysterical as they searched in groups among the wreckage on the sand for some word of the fate of their loved ones.

Still Search for Bodies

Marine squad police, exhausted by their all night vigil, continued their cruise, keeping a sharp lookout for additional bodies.

Forty persons in all are believed to have lost their lives while boating in Long Island Sound. Many others were killed by falling trees, lightning and accidents caused by the wind. Ten boys who drowned were recovered last night.

The storm came at the close of one of the most torrid days of the season. It raged over City Island, sweeping into the Northwest and increased in velocity to eighty-eight miles. Sweeping through New Jersey, Westchester County and the Bronx, the Bronx and Manhattan, they left death and destruction in their wake.

Torrential rains, then lightning followed the wind.

Thousands Sought Relief

Hundreds of thousands of New Yorkers, weary of the heat and with various outlets for their relief, were in the water at night when the storm broke, and it was from these that the storm took its toll.

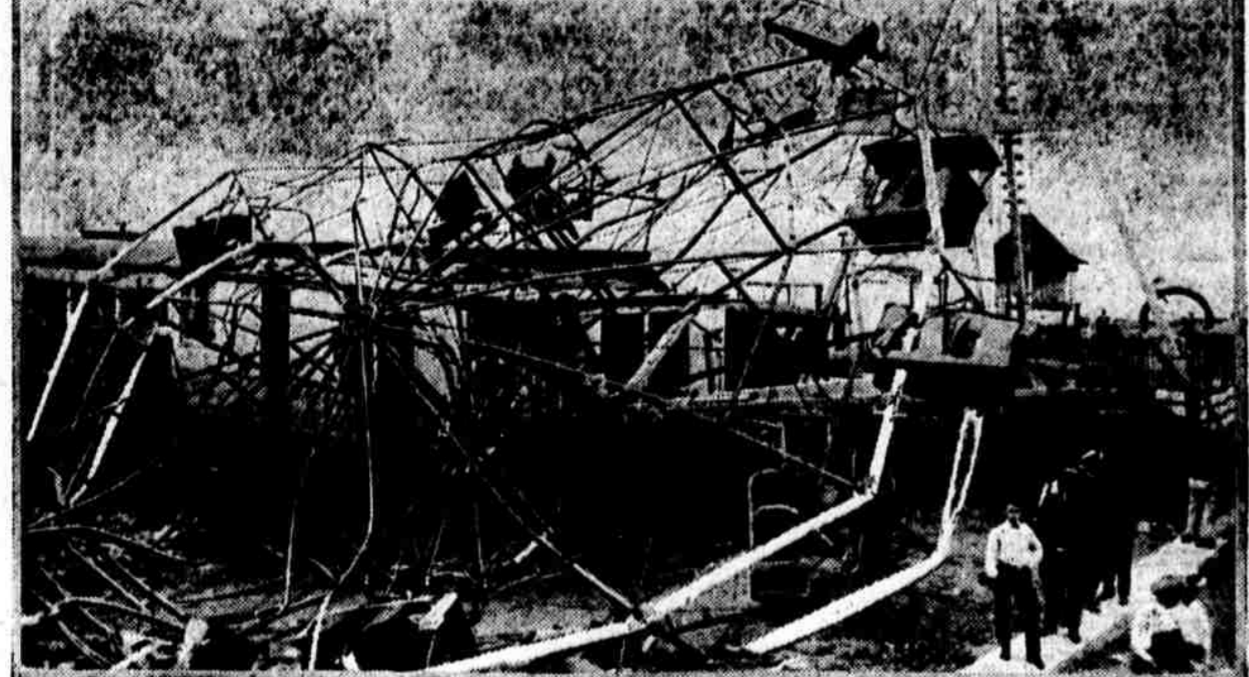
Powerful searchlights played over the water at City Island last night as the search for bodies went on.

DR. KING'S SURVEY READY FOR EXPERTS

Probed State Finances for Ten Years to Present Pinchot Commission

IS NAMED HEAD OF BODY

A digest of all State appropriations for the last ten years now awaits an impartial commission on State finances named by Gifford Pinchot, Republican nominee for Governor.

The data was gathered by Dr. Clyde L. King, noted economist of the University of Pennsylvania and one of the fourteen men and women who have accepted membership on the commission.

The first meeting will be held June 20 in the City Club, when preliminary plans will be laid before the members. The project is part of Mr. Pinchot's plan to abolish "half-or-miss" financing in the administration of the Commonwealth.

The four other Philadelphia members are: Albert B. Johnson, Senator; Woodward Charles J. Rhoads, former governor of the Federal Reserve Bank of Philadelphia; and Mrs. Barclay H. Warburton, vice chairman of the Republican State Committee.

Others who have accepted Mr. Pinchot's invitation are John S. Fisher, Leonard T. Fox, Harrisburg; Allen W. Hagenback, Allentown; Mrs. Mary Flinn Lawrence, Pittsburgh.

Senator D. Edward Long, Chambersburg; Mrs. Walter King Sharp, Chambersburg; T. D. Stiles, Pottsville; P. Willis, of Ward, Pa.; and Paul D. Wright, of Erie.

King Ready With Plans

Dr. King, who probably will act as chairman of the unofficial commission, said today the preliminary plans cannot be made until they are placed before the commission.

Dr. King has held numerous conferences with the nominees, both in this city and at Greer Towers, the Pinchot estate in Pike County.

"I have checked over all the State appropriations for the last ten years and a large quantity of material is ready for the commission," he said.

"We are also assured of the co-operation of Auditor-General Lewis."

Mr. Johnson said he regarded Mr. Pinchot's idea of investigating State finances as very wise. There is too short a time between the election of a Governor and the convening of the Legislature for such an extensive study, he proposed by the commission, Mr. Johnson stated.

"Mr. Pinchot, in effect if not in name, has secured the cooperation of the Auditor-General."

"Nevertheless," he said, "the offense of kidnapping is more serious than the punishment visited upon this youth should be to the full extent of the law."
