

Adirondack Hotels Ready for Their Biggest Season

Surprises in Store for Visitors to Various Resort Centers. Prospective Guests Include Many Prominent Philadelphians

Adirondack Mountains, N. Y., June 14.—For the many Philadelphians who will spend this summer in the Adirondacks there are numerous surprises in store at the various resort centers where they have spent so many delightful summer seasons in the past. New resorts have been built and old ones improved; new golf courses constructed and others made as good as new.

Developments existing to the hotels attract attention in large measure to Lake Placid and Saranac Lake. In the latter village has been launched a movement to erect a new hotel of 200 rooms, many of them on the site of the former Amperand Hotel on the shore of the beautiful Lower Saranac Lake. George H. Gable, of New York, represents the hotel interests back of this new Adirondack undertaking.

The growing determination of Adirondack hoteliers to make of the region an all-year resort is also evidenced at Lake Placid, where the Grand View Hotel, which was recently sold, will be kept open during the summer season from June 24 to the close of September and will again be opened each winter for a period of two and one-half months while the Lake Placid winter sports are in progress.

Extensive improvements have been made upon the invernor accommodations of the Grand View, and several innovations calculated to add to the comfort of guests are being made about the property. In fact, improvements are the rule at most of the Lake Placid hotels. Among the principal work done at the Stevens House is a big addition to the dining-room included in plans for the most popular with Philadelphians at Whiteface Inn, on the western shore of the beautiful lake from which the village takes its name. Whiteface Inn continues under the management of J. J. Sweeney, of New York, and Allen, S. C., where he is the manager of the Highland Park hotel. Mrs. Joseph Schenck, Mr. Joseph S. Jenck, Jr., and family; Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Schaffus and Mr. S. W. Brock and family are among some of those from Philadelphia who annually spend the summer at the Inn, and will arrive early.

T. A. Leahy, manager of Lakewood Inn, Lake Placid, has just completed improvements at that popular hotel.

Among those with cottages at Saranac Inn who are coming from Philadelphia for the season are Henry H. Pirth, the Rev. and Mrs. A. H. Hoag and Mr. and Mrs. J. Wilmer Robb and family. Mr. and Mrs. Henry Feizer Harris and family of Harrison, Chesnut Hill, Pa., are reserved one of the camps

at the Inn, and will spend the season there.

Members of the family of George H. Earle and Dr. and Mrs. George Fule Baker are among the campers from Philadelphia and its suburbs who usually arrive early at their camps on the St. Regis chain of lakes, doing much entertaining during the summer.

Robert Nelson, of Philadelphia, who is a vice president of the Cobble Hill Golf Club at Elizabethtown, annually spends the summer at the Windsor Hotel in that village and takes an active part in the club's annual August tournament, which is the golf classic of the Adirondacks.

resort by way of Saratoga and Glens Falls, over fine macadam roads. A beautiful automobile drive is the macadam road down the Bolton road to Bolton Landing. This road has been called "Millionaires' road," owing to the fact that so many of the show places of the lake are to be seen along its length.

"Elowet," which will be occupied this summer by Governor Nathan L. Miller, is two miles out of Lake George village on this road.

The Lake-George Club, whose greens are a delight to the golf enthusiasts of the cottage colony here, is located six miles north from Lake George village.

The entertainment committee of the club is planning many new features for the summer.

Lake George is noted for the purity of its waters. The sanitation laws are strict and even the steamboats on the lake have to carry their ashes ashore and dump them there.

Fishing is good along the entire length of the lake, a distance of thirty-six miles.

Another feature that adds much to the fame of this lake is the bathing. Railroad accommodations going into and out of Lake George Terminal of the Delaware and Hudson Company are good, and through Pullman trains are operated between here and New York.

Fast steamers connect with the trains at Lake George Terminal for points all along the lake.

Two of the most desirable months here are June and September, although the majority of the vacationists select the rush months of July and August to visit here.

There are many regattas on the lake during the season and some spirited contests are witnessed between high-powered motorboats.

The hotel accommodations here, although somewhat limited, are of the best, and reservations may be secured in advance at practically all of them.

BAR HARBOR CHARM

Bar Harbor, Me., June 14.—The Gateway of the Lafayette National Park, Bar Harbor, Me., is picturesque and combines the lure of the rock-bound coast, the mountains and the sea, while inland the Kobo Valley Club golf links offer an eighteen-hole course for golfers.

Bar Harbor has its Building of Arts, where concerts by noted artists hold sway in summer, a pool and tennis courts at the various clubs, while the lakes abound in trout and salmon.
