Ordinance Ordered for Benefit of Motorists

Parking of automobiles on Chestnut street between Tenth and Sixteenth streets is banned, and on all other central city streets it is limited to one hour, in a traffic ordinance passed by

City Council yesterday. The one-bour parking rule applies to all strets within the territory bounded by Vine, Pine, Seventh and Twentieth

by time, then a structure by time, the streets. Beyond that limit parking is per-mitted for an unlimited period. The ordinance ended a discussion that has lasted for months, and sup-plants all previous legislation on the subject. Thousands of copies were ordered printed and distributed among the

motorists. The ordinance was adopted by a vote of 19 to 1, Councilman Roper saying that traffic was an engineering problem that ought not to be tinkered with by

Councilmen. An experiment in the handling of traffic is provided for in the section that prohibits all parking between 4:30 and 6:30 P. M. on Brond street between Erie avenue and South street between Erie avenue and South street and on Arch and Market streets from Seventh errest to the Schuvikill. Councilmen. street to the Schuylkill. The proviso is designed to clear the main orderies of traffic of all parked vehicles during the evening rush hour in order to accelerate the flow of

in order to accelerate the flow of vehicles from the center of the city. If successful it will also be extended to include other streets and the morning rush hour. Londing stations forty feet in length are provided in the middle of all blocks in the parking area. Whether the Mayor will sign the or-dinance remains to be seen. He has indicated that he would hardly sanction en ordinance providing for one hour

indicated that he would hardly sanction an ordinance providing for one hour parking on the busy downtown thoroughfares, but councilmanic leaders say they have the thirteen votes neces-

sary to pass the ordinance over a veto in the event the Mayor disapproves the ordinance. One proviso in the ordinance requires the motorist to extend his arm as a warning signal at least ten feet in ad-


vance of making a turn or coming to stop. Mr. Roper sought to have this distance increased to fifty feet and was voted down.






