CROWDS FLOCK TO VIEW NOTED SARGENT CANVAS

"Duchess of Sutherland" is Hung in Memorial Hall

Art lovers are thronging to Memorial Hall to see Sargent's famous portrait of the Duchess of Sutherland. The painting, which arrived Friday, was purchased by the Fairmount Park Commission and has just been hung in the rooms with the W. P. Wilstach collection.

It is a vivid, striking work of the artist, his sure, easy stroke easily recognized. The Duchess, in the picture, is standing by a garden table, the slender fingers of her right hand resting on the edge.

Her gown is of Nile green and figures of silver form a delicate design on the fabric of the gown. Her hair is fastened in the middle and caught back with a wreath of silver leaves.

The painting hangs in a room in which is another of Sargent's work, "Lady Eden," and also "Whistler," well-known "Woman in the Yellow Buskin," a portrait of Lady Archibald Campbell.
