Washington, June 19.—(By A. P.)

Francis Howard Williams, author. et, and descendant of one of the oldest families in the State, who died at his home in Germantown yesterday in his seventy-eighth year, will be buried tomorrow afternoon. Services will be held in St. Luke's Episcopai Church, Germantown, on the vestry of which he served for many years.

Mr. Williams, whose ancestry in this country goes back to the days of William Penn, had been ill since the death of his wife, Mrs. Mary B. Houston Williams, in February, 1920. Most of his life had been devoted to literature and he was known as a leader in many literary movements. He contributed generously himself in poetry and prose to the newspapers and magazines.

He began a business career, and although, as it turned out, he was destined for the world of art, his business ventures were all successful. From lumbering he turned to the wool business as a member of the firm of Seal, Williams & Co.

Mr. Williams also had other business interests, such as coal and railroading. He withdrew from all of these when the lure of the pen became too strong for him.

Mr. Williams was born in this city September 2, 1844. He was a son of Joseph J. Williams and Martha P. Shoemaker Williams. His early education was received from tutors and later, at the Baldwin Classical School at Broad and Arch streets, from which he was graduated in 1860.

For ten years he contributed to the papers and magazines. Among his writings, the more serious of which came after his journalistic career, were the Princess Elizabeth, a lyric drama, 1880; The Higher Education, a comedy in two acts, 1881; Theodora, a Christmas pastoral, 1882; Master and Man, a play in five acts, 1884; Atman, the Documents in a Strange Case. Man, a play in five acts, 1884; Atman, the Documents in a Strange Case, 1891; Pennsylvania Poets of the Provincial Period, an essay, 1893; the Flute Player and Other Poems, 1894; At the Rise of the Curtain, Dramatic Preludes, 1904. Electra, one of his shorter and best-known poems, follows:




