HUTCHISON LOSES BRITISH GOLF LEAD

Kirkwood Shoots 72 for Aggregate of 147—Jock Turns in 78 Strokes

BARNES PLAYS BRILLIANTLY

Sandwich, Eng., June 20.—After turning in 71 for his first qualifying round yesterday, Jock Hutchison, of Chicago, present champion, was seven strokes worse in his second qualifying round of the British open golf championship here today.

Hutchison took 78, and this gave him an aggregate for the thirty-six holes of 149.

Jim Barnes, the Australian champion, passed Hutchison in the race for the qualifying medal. He shot 72 today, and his aggregate of 147 was the best turned in up to the early afternoon.

Jim Barnes cut ten strokes off his score of yesterday, getting a 72 for a total of 147. Barnes played brilliantly going out. His golf was flawless and he reached the turn in 33. Coming home, he made some mistakes, taking 39.

Other aggregate scores were: Harry Vardon, 152; Carl Tully, 150; Walter Hagen, another American, turned in 75 yesterday, but got away to a late start today.

Admiral Boomer, of the St. Cloud Club, Paris, yesterday played a brilliant round in 72, while Roger Wetherby, one of the English amateur stars, scored a 73.

Carl Tully and Captain Carter, two amateurs, had 77, and he in seventh position. Willie Hunter made a 79, and George Duncan 81. Jack White scored 71 and James Brad 79.

W. R. Bourne, of Stockport, made a 73, and T. Walton, of Lytham Stanes, 74.

Two hundred and twenty-five players had entered the tournament, and all except nine started. The eighty men having the lowest aggregate scores in the qualifying rounds of today and tomorrow will be eligible to compete for the open championship.

Hutchison's score yesterday ranks as the second lowest for the course. His card was as follows:
