

GOMPERS IS AGAIN LABOR PRESIDENT

Demonstration Breaks Loose After Unanimous Election by Federation

ONE CONTEST DEVELOPS

Cincinnati, O., June 23.—(By Associated Press.) Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor was re-elected without opposition today in the federation's annual convention. After the unionists vote had been cast for Mr. Gompers a demonstration broke loose among the delegates which continued a few minutes. Then Mr. Gompers thanked the delegates and added:

"I shall endeavor to give the best that is in me."

The convention also re-elected James Duncan, of Quincy, Mass., representing the Granite Cutters' Union, as first vice president; Joseph F. Valentine, Cincinnati, Molders' Union, second vice president; Frank Kelly, Indianapolis, Carpenters' Union, third vice president; William Green, Indianapolis, Miners' Union, fourth vice president; W. D. Mahon, Detroit, Street Carriers' Union, fifth vice president; and T. A. Rickett, Chicago, Garment Workers' Union, sixth vice president.

The first contest developed when Thomas F. Flaherty, of Washington, representing the Postoffice Clerks' Union, was nominated to oppose the reelection of Jacob Fischer, of Indianapolis, as president of the Barber's Union, as seventh vice president of the federation.

Mr. Flaherty defeated Mr. Fischer by a vote of 17,725 to 13,279, after Mr. Mattie A. Wall, of Chicago, representing the Photo Engravers' Union, was re-elected eighth vice president without a contest.

In the second contest Samuel J. De- Mr. of Indianapolis, president of the Teamsters' Union, won reelection as treasurer over Joseph A. Franklin, of Kansas City, Kan., president of the Bootmakers' Union. The vote was: Tolin, 18,519; Franklin, 12,542.

The election of officers was completed except election of fraternal delegates by the reelection without opposition of Frank Morrison, of Washington, as secretary. He is a member of the Printers' Union, and has been secretary for twenty-five years.

The delegates arose and applauded the reelection of Morrison.

Bronx Man Asserts He Never Was "Missing"

New York, June 23.—(By A. P.)—Allegations made by Mrs. Michael J. Slattery, of Kingsbridge road, Bronx, in the first divorce suit brought in that county under the new "Enoch Arden" law, will be investigated today by the District Attorney. Witnesses have been summoned to his office.

The "Enoch Arden" law permits divorce when a spouse has been absent five years and cannot be found. Mrs. Slattery began her action last week. Michael Joseph Slattery appeared at the Bronx County Clerk's office Wednesday.

"Who says I'm dead?" he demanded. "I'm the missing husband. My wife has known all along that I have lived at 442 East 132d street."

SILZER FOR GOVERNOR

New Jersey Circuit Court Judge Announces His Candidacy

Trenton, June 23.—(By A. P.)—Circuit Court Judge G. G. Silzer, of Metuchen, today formally announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Governor. State Banking and Insurance Commissioner William E. Tuttle, Jr., of Westfield, has been an avowed candidate for some time, and a bitter primary election campaign seems certain to result.

It is expected that Mayor Frank Hague, of Jersey City, will actively support Judge Silzer, while M. Tamm will receive the backing of independent Democrats.

Judge Silzer made his decision known in a letter written in reply to one addressed to him by Middlesex County Judge Peter E. DeLoe. Judge DeLoe pointed out that Middlesex County is active in politics were unanimous in the desire to have Judge Silzer elected Governor.

OLD-AGE PENSIONS URGED

Congressman Moran Addresses Convention of New Jersey Eagles

Atlantic City, June 23.—Addressing the New Jersey State convention of the fraternal Order of Eagles, Congressman John M. Moran, of Pittsburgh, national president, urged support for a measure to establish old age pension laws in all States of the Union.

"The Eagles will not be content until we see an old age pension law enacted in every State. Such a bill has already been introduced, and we must lend all our efforts to seeing that it goes through the various Houses of Congress. If the bill becomes a law it will provide for \$25 a month being given to any person whose income does not exceed \$200 a year."

Congressman Moran asserted that the actual cost to the State under the pension system would be less than the present running of homes for the aged.

London, June 23.—(By A. P.)—Chief Justice Taft of the United States has been elected an honorary member of the Middle Temple. The late Joseph H. Choate, Ambassador to Great Britain, 1880 to 1905, and John W. Davis, more recently Ambassador to the Court of St. James, were similarly honored.
