DOG VACCINATION IS URGED TO PREVENT RABIES SPREAD

Dr. William Lentz Advocates Treatment of Animals in District Where Mad Canine Molesters Have Been Found

Vaccination of dogs against rabies is a necessary safeguard with the advent of hot weather.

This is the declaration of Dr. William Lentz, director of the Small Animal Hospital and professor of veterinary anatomy at the University of Pennsylvania, and of Dr. John A. Kollmer, bacteriologist at the Polytchnic Hospital.

Both doctors endorse the use of the serum, but they say that so far experimentation has not yet shown whether a dog who has been vaccinated is immune from rabies for more than a year.

Dr. Kollmer treated a Villanova College student who recently died from rabies. He believes that dogs in a locality in which there has been rabies should be vaccinated.

Dr. Lentz says that at present he would advise the six-injection method for domesticated animals. The twenty-four-injection plan is the one used for human beings. It is safest, he says, but is too slow.

"A dog who has actually been bitten by a rabid dog cannot be saved from rabies by vaccination," he says. "The vaccination which I think is imperative in quarantined districts is to protect dogs against the climatic conditions that caused the one dog to go mad and to protect them from mad dogs who might stray in from outside the district."
