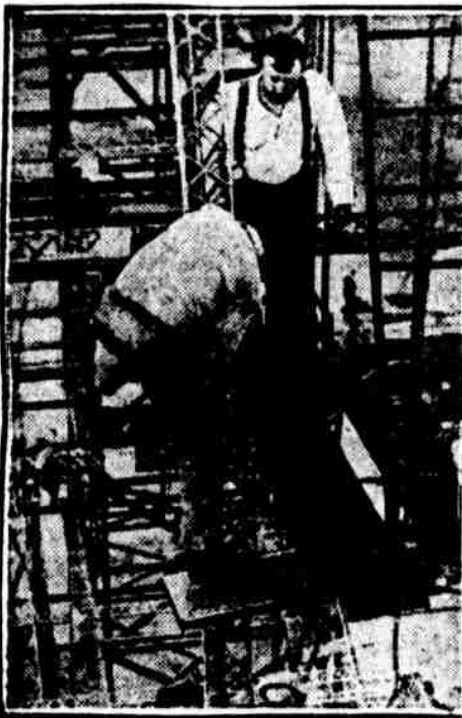

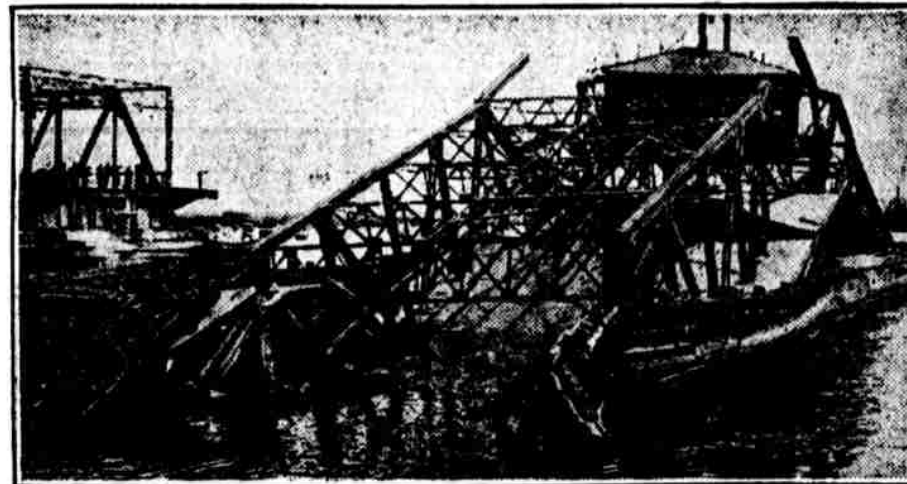

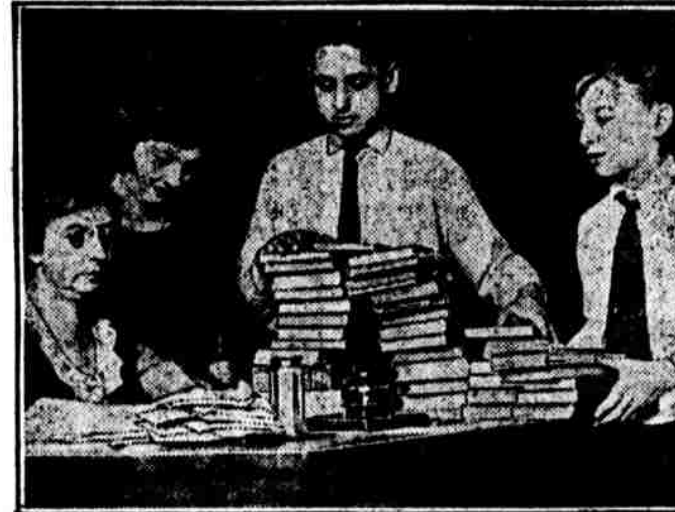
BUILDING GIANT AIRSHIP. Work is well under way at Lakehurst, N. J., where the ZR-1 is being built under the supervision of army engineers

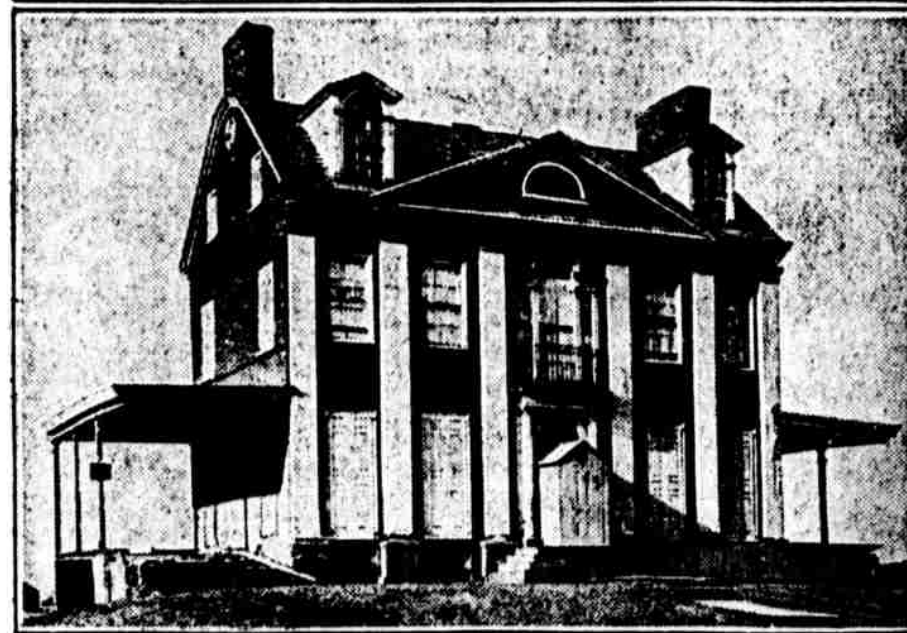

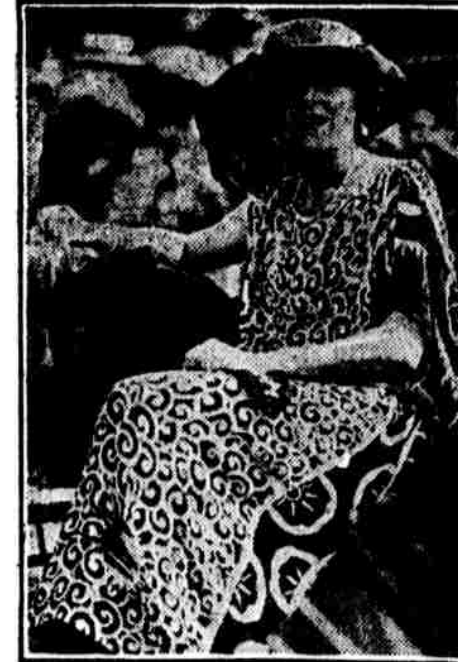
CAN YOU RECALL THIS BIT OF OLD PHILADELPHIA?

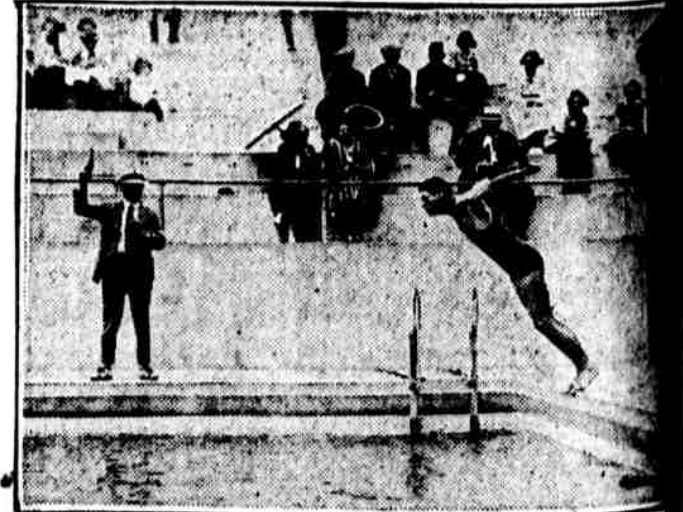
