

### MEXICAN TROOPS HUNT KIDNAPPERS

Seizure of Americans Isolated Outbreaks of Banditry, Government Believes

### BIELASKI STILL CAPTIVE

Mexico City, June 28.—Mexican Government officials believe that the kidnapping of A. Bruce Bielaski in the state of Morelos and the capture of forty other Americans near Tampico within a few hours of each other are isolated cases of banditry which will be speedily attended to by the Federal troops now in pursuit.

Secretary of War Soriano has not yet been officially advised of the seizure of the Cortez Oil Company's property near Tampico and the detention of forty employees, but newspaper reports caused him to direct General Guadalupe Ramirez, Federal commander in that zone, to start a campaign against the rebels in the entire region.

Three Hundred Rebels Under Arms—General Gorozave, commanding the Tampico rebels, was reported killed several weeks ago, but, according to the War Office, he suddenly appeared in the Huasteca region last week, and his activities against the oil companies' Aguda camps are incident to his program of outlawry. Gorozave, who is a Spaniard, is said to have nearly three hundred well-armed men under his command.

No news has reached here from Tampico concerning the capture, and local representatives of the Cortez interests said they had no information other than that contained in dispatches from Washington. It is rumored here that of the forty captured men, a dozen are Americans, the remainder being British subjects.

According to advices from Cuernavaca negotiations are still in progress between Mr. Bielaski's friends and his bandit captors, a brief message from

the former stating: "Arrangements for release almost completed. Bruce safe and well."

In some quarters it is asserted that the presence in Cuernavaca of numerous friends of Mr. Bielaski had vitiated against his speedy release, as various attempts are being made to pay over the ransom, none of which complies with the program strictly outlined by the bandits last Sunday.

**Troops Hunting Bandits**  
Mexican Government agents are known to have been in Cuernavaca since Sunday night with sufficient funds to meet the ransom demands, but actual contact with the bandits has not been accomplished. The War Office announces that two columns of troops equipped for mountain and hill fighting are now scouring the terrain adjacent to Cuernavaca.

There appears to be no general feeling here that there is any connection between the Tampico capture and the kidnapping of Mr. Bielaski, and the most popular belief is that the latter is being held by ordinary bandits who were in need of money and who apparently selected their victim from the scores of Americans and other foreigners who traversed the road between Cuernavaca and the famous caves of Cuauquimilpa last Sunday. The developments of the last few days have caused little stir in Mexican official circles, although in some quarters it is said that formal ratification of Financial Secretary de la Huerta's agreement with the New York bankers was deliberately postponed yesterday so as to allow the situation to clarify before proceeding.

awaiting word today of the fate of the forty American employees of the Cortez Oil Company at Tampico, Mexico, which the State Department yesterday was informed had been seized by bandits, and, together with a quarter of a million dollars' worth of destructible property of the company, held as security for a ransom of 15,000 pesos.

Report of the outcome of the seizure was expected hourly from the Embassy at Mexico City or the Consul at Tampico.

Due to what appears to be a rigid censorship at Tampico, the State Department's information on the bandit action early today was still confined
