Plan to Die Because of Wrongs Suffered in Girlhood Indicated in Missives

SUICIDE THEORY REJECTED

Stroudsburg, Pa., June 29.—Pathelet letters, indicating that Mrs. Maude Demund had planned to die because of wrongs she is said to have suffered during her girlhood days, have given a new turn to the mysterious killing of the bride of four months and her husband as they lay in bed.

Text of Letter to Mother

The letter Mrs. Demund wrote to her mother reads: "My Own Dear Mother: I came through the operation all right, but I am suffering untold agony. I do not care how soon the end comes. Why this has all had to happen to me is too terrible to mention. I have got the dearest mother in the world, but I can't bear to see him, all on account of Charles.
