WHITE SOX EXHIBIT WONDERFUL FORM IN GAINING THIRD PLACE

In Twenty-three Days Gleason's Team Wins Sixteen Out of Twenty-two Games—Athletics Back in Seventh Place as Phils Linger on Brink

COUNTED as a last-place possibility and rated man for man as the worst team in the American League, Kid Gleason's White Sox are today the wonder team of the season.

After the World Series of 1919 the White Sox were in ill repute, but it took well on in the 1920 season before the reputation of Gleason, Jackson and their pals was discovered.

On June 6 the White Sox were deep in last place, where the series had placed them before the season opened.

JUNE 6 marked the change in the White Sox. Since that day they started a winning streak and have crept back up to third place in the league.

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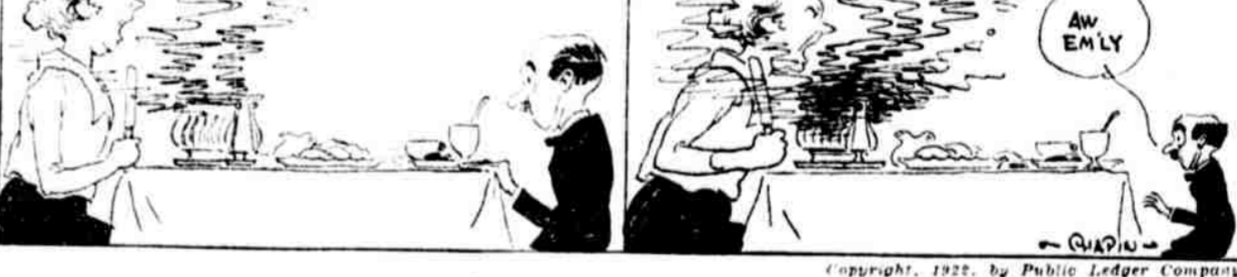
