MOORE HAS BEEN OF LITTLE VALUE THIS YEAR TO ATHLETICS

Southpaw to Be Traded by Mack, After Good Year in 1921, Has Failed Dismally This Season—A's Finally Beat Yanks as Phils Again Trounce Braves

THE decision of Cornelius McGillicuddy to trade Roy Moore, once labeled the Waco Wizard, ends, so far as this city is concerned, one of the brightest prospects to come up from the sticks in many years.

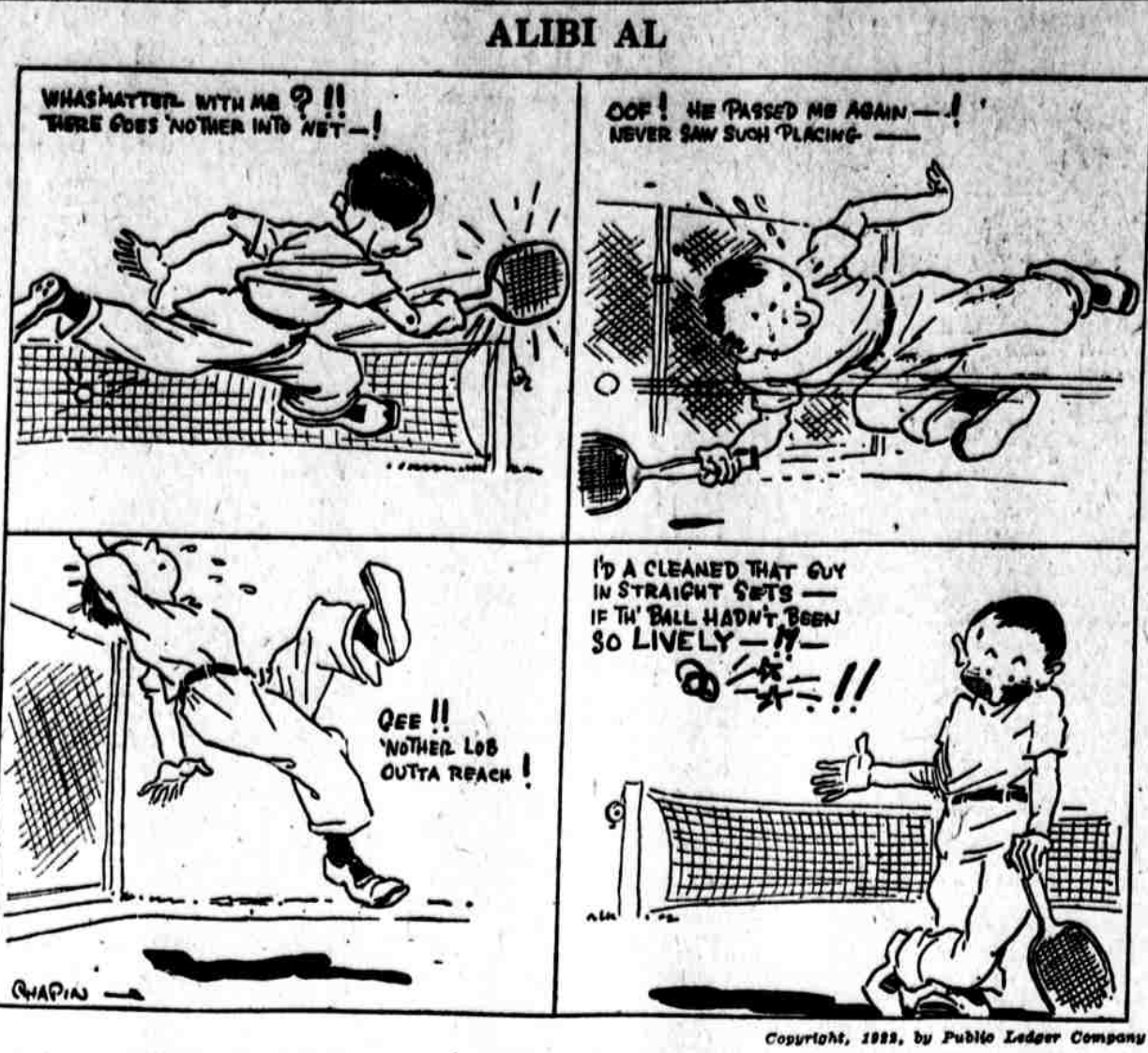

TO REDUCE OLYMPIC FUND

French Government Seeks to Cut Appropriation 4,000,000 Francs Paris, July 5.—The measure appropriating 10,000,000 francs as the Government's share in the organization of the Olympic games for 1924 came up again before the Senate's finance committee, which showed a disposition to reduce the amount, possibly to 6,000,000, with close control of both receipts and expenditures.
