The salty tang of sailor talk and the hardihood of those who go down to the sea in ships never "Tide Rips" (Charles Scribner's Sons), the latest collection of the masterly tales of the deep by James B. Connolly.

The stories gathered in this volume are more vivid, ranging in environment and motif than those in "Hiker Joy," which had mostly to do with the naval side of the Great War.

Hiker, by the way, with ever delightful Bill Green, reappears in "The Rakish Brigantine." The Gloucester fisherman whom Mr. Connolly has hitherto celebrated in sympathetic fiction, now seen again in "What Price for God?"

One of the most touching of the tales is "The Munition Ship" dealing with a bluejacket who tries to square himself with conscience. Then there is a whimsical and ironical story of a couple of Americans beating their way to Athens to take part in the Olympics.

All in all "Tide Rips" always represents Mr. Connolly's readability and often at his excellent best.
