LAST-MINUTE NEWS
SEVERAL HURT IN WALL FALL AT BROAD AND CHERRY STEETS
A portion of wall collapsed on the eleventh floor of the old Parkway Building, at Broad and Cherry streets, shortly before 2 o'clock this afternoon, seriously injuring several workmen.
Six men had been carried from the ruins within fifteen minutes of the collapse and workmen were searching for others in spite of danger from another section of wall on the point of falling. Thousands gathered in the street and ambulances were sent from all nearby hospitals.

STORMS EXPECTED TO END HEAT WAVE
Thunderstorms which the weather man says will arrive late today are expected to end the stilling heat which has gripped the city for two days, causing two deaths and ten prostrations.
A third death was caused yesterday by a terrible storm which hit over the northeast section, and several persons were stunned by lightning in many places.
Robert Gray, sixty-seven years old, 278 Mantua street, died while sleeping after being struck by the heat yesterday. George Miller, sixty, Stonehouse lane and Pennsylvania Railroad, died yesterday, also a heat victim.

WOMAN OVERCOME BY GAS
Wind Thought to Have Blown Out Light as She Slept
Mrs. Clara Seidle, thirty-six years old, was found on the floor of a bedroom in her home at 803 North Sixth street, early this morning. She was unconscious from gas poisoning.
'It is thought the gas, which she had lighted, was blown out by a strong gust of wind when she fell asleep. Apparently awakened as the fumes began to overpower her, Mrs. Seidle crawled from the bed and staggered to a window, but was overcome before she had a chance to open it.

DR. MERCER IN HOSPITAL
Former Penn Football Star Recovering After Operation
Dr. Leroy Mercer, physical instructor at Swarthmore College, former captain of the University of Pennsylvania football team and all-American fullback for two years, is in the Medical-Chirurgical College Hospital, recovering from an operation for appendicitis.
Dr. Mercer was operated on Tuesday. He has been reported out of danger and is recovering rapidly.

MOTHER RESCUES BABY IN OGDEN STREET FIRE
Mrs. Della Willis Slightly Burned Running Through Flames
Six-month-old Margaret Willis was rescued from a second-floor room at 5137 Ogden street today when fire was discovered by her mother, Mrs. Della Willis, who ran through the flames to her child's room.
The child had been affected by smoke but was soon revived by neighbors after being carried to the street by Mrs. Willis. Two other children of the Willis family, David, Jr., five, and Delia, eight, were downstairs when the fire started.

HAGUE AND GENOA JUSTIFY U. S. STAND
Conferences Merely Delay Self. Reconstruction of Russian Government

Washington, July 13.—The expected break-up at The Hague is held here to justify the Administration's policy of refusal to participate in this conference with regard to Russia.
The view of Secretary Hughes has been that both this conference and its predecessor at Genoa merely delayed the steady revision of the Soviet system by the Russians themselves and thus put off the day when the attitude toward property in Russia would be sufficiently in harmony with that of the rest of the world to make recognition inevitable.
