GLORIA SWANSON ACCUSED OF USING UNDUE INFLUENCE

Will of Film Star's Stepfather is Contested in Court. Los Angeles, July 13.—(By A. P.)—Testimony intended to show that Matthew P. Burns, stepfather of Gloria Swanson, motion picture actress, was of unsound mind when he made his will in favor of his wife, was introduced by contestants of the will in local Superior Court yesterday.

Witnesses related many instances in which Burns acted peculiarly, and from which, they said, they formed the opinion that he was "irrational."
