DEMAND FOR STEEL CONTINUES ACTIVE

Some of the Mills Feeling the Pinch of Coal Shortage

New York, July 15.—Were it not for the fact that some of the steel mills are feeling the pinch of the coal shortage, the conditions in the steel industry could be described as excellent. This one factor, however, is considered only temporarily, and will be cleared up before long, according to the opinion of the leading authorities in the industry.

The steel mills of the country are operating at present at an average of no more than 75 per cent. This is a decrease of probably 3 per cent from the highest reached since the increase started several months ago, and is attributed directly to the fact that some of the smaller plants have been compelled to curtail because their supply of coal was dwindling.

Plants of the United States Steel Corporation are stated authoritatively to be working at 77 per cent of capacity, which is a drop of less than 2 per cent from about ten days ago. This decrease is due only in part to the coal shortage, because so far as can be learned the corporation is still getting its share of fuel.

Some of the large independent steel plants are working at the same average, namely about 75 per cent, but a number of the smaller companies are doing much less, and indications are that the latter will be compelled to reduce still further mainly because the stocks of coal carried were not large enough in the first place.

Had many of these smaller companies put in a proportionate amount of coal to that taken by the leading steel companies in the months before the strike, they would have been able, with the supply now getting better, to keep up their operations at a satisfactory rate right up to the present time.

The most important development in the steel industry continues to be the good demand from consumers. Orders of steel are continuing to arrive in their regular quantities, indicating that many delayed placing orders too long, and are now in want of the material to meet their requirements for the immediate future.

Several of the big companies, including the United States Steel Corporation, have found their greatest difficulty in meeting the needs of the consumers who have been repeatedly requesting that the makers anticipate deliveries on some of the contracts now on their books in order to help the consumer in his present predicament.

In addition there has been active buying by some users for practically immediate delivery. A number of the latter are steel companies which have been able to meet the needs of their buyers regarding shipments on orders now being issued have found little difficulty in getting a small premium for the various steel products wanted.
