CATTELL RESIGNS AS STATISTICIAN

Quits on July 31, After Serving City for 22 Years, to Join Commerce Chamber

HAS MADE 20,000 SPEECHES

Edward J. Cattell has resigned as City Statistician, closing a term of twenty-two years' service for the city. He will become field manager of the conventions and exhibitions bureau of the Chamber of Commerce. His resignation will take effect July 31. In his period in office Mr. Cattell has made 20,000 speeches, speaking in every State in the Union, and has represented seven successive Mayors at various gatherings. De Cattell in announcing his resignation said that he was led to make the change because he believed that "Philadelphia's cause could be better advanced by such a strong representative organization as the Chamber of Commerce and to better effect than under municipal auspices." He told last Tuesday two years ago he started upon his speech-making career as City Statistician. "Everybody was knocking Philadelphia then," he said, "and nobody had a word of praise for it. I appeared before a credit men's convention in the Bourse Building and told of the wonderful things Philadelphia had within its confines and its great possibilities. It was an unusual speech for those days and when I concluded, the chairman arose and said, 'Thank God there is somebody who isn't afraid to praise his native city.' The next ten years I devoted to showing Philadelphians what a great city they lived in. Lately I have endeavored to travel more and preach Philadelphia in neighboring cities, so that a feeling of friendship would be established between Philadelphia and the cities that have always looked upon this as a slow town. Alva B. Johnson, president of the Chamber of Commerce, and James P. A. O'Connor, chairman of the Conventions Committee, in announcing the appointment said they foresaw a useful opportunity for 'selling Philadelphia.' Mayor Moore in accepting the resignation termed Dr. Cattell one of the most remarkable men in the field of American oratory." He said that the retiring statistician's record in talking Philadelphia exceeded that of any other man. As City Statistician, Dr. Cattell received a salary of approximately \$2000. While no announcement of salary was made, it is believed generally he now will receive double that figure.

DEMOCRATIC GOAL \$75,000

Finance Plan of State Committee Announced by McCullough Harrisburg, July 18.—The Democratic State Committee finance plan was announced last night by State Chairman Austin E. McCullough, following a meeting with the Finance Committee headed by E. A. Rieger, of Clearfield, and will consist of raising \$75,000, by apportioning \$10,000 in each county, \$10,000 having already been underwritten. The plan is to raise \$5000 in \$1, \$5 and \$10 contributions; \$10,000 in \$20 gifts; \$27,000 in \$100 gifts; \$12,500 in \$250 gifts and \$10,000 in \$1000 contributions. Two \$1000 contributions have been made.

WORKERS' PARTY INDORSED

Moscow Tells American Communists to Avoid Legal Actions Chicago, July 18.—The Communist International at Moscow has endorsed the Workers' Party as "the legal party of the Underground Communist Party" in the United States, according to a statement issued by Otto Brauns, secretary of the Social Party, yesterday. The Moscow International adopted orders covering the two parties, which said in part that: "The program of the legal party will have to be somewhat restricted. The party must guard itself against the tendency to repudiate or neglect the illegal work—the tendency to become legal in fact as well as in outward appearance. No matter what maneuvers may be upon the public stage, the final class struggle must be until its end, a brutal fight of physical force."

The engineer saw the girl, thought she was killed and stopped the train. The crew got her from under the tenth car. She was frightened, slightly scratched, but otherwise uninjured.

KILAUEA VOLCANO ACTIVE

Honolulu, July 18.—(By A. P.)—Kilauea volcano, whose lake of mountain lava some weeks ago dropped hundreds of feet and led to speculation as to whether the crater ever again would be active, broke forth again yesterday with its old-time vigor. Lava spurted 100 feet from the bottom, making a livid pool 300 feet in diameter with brilliant molten fountains spraying forty feet in the air.
