

GARLAND FORTUNE GOES TO LIBERALS

Greenwich Villagers May Spend Million Rejected by Young Farmer as They Will

PLAN ODD EXPERIMENTS

New York, July 19.—Charles Garland's famous fortune of \$1,000,000 which he first rejected and then decided to accept is now destined to fall into the hands of a group of Greenwich Village liberal thinkers, whose views of life, including matrimony, are shared by the young unwilling-to-be-millionaires.

The prospective recipients of the money have incorporated as "The American Fund for Public Service" for the purpose of receiving it. Formal announcement of the gift has not been made, pending a few finishing touches, but it was learned yesterday that it is in immediate prospect and that Garland, who still tills the soil on his remote Cape Cod farm, is thoroughly committed to this plan of divesting himself of his riches.

To Aid New Agencies

What is to become of the money after it is thus conferred remains a somewhat uncertain matter. According to the incorporators of the fund, they expect to use it in aid of "agencies" which are so new or experimental that they do not command general public support.

Garland, who is now twenty-two and separates from his wife and two small children since his unsuccessful experiments in bringing a "social-mat" into his household a year ago, recently came to New York and agreed to endorse the contemplated organization. This came about largely through previous contact with its leading spirits, the incorporators, are Norman M. Thomas and Lewis Gannett, of this city, associate editors of the Nation; Prof. Robert M. La Follette, of the University of Chicago, and Roger N. Baldwin, director of the American Civil Liberties Union.

Directors of Fund

Directors of the fund are Prof. Harry F. Ward, of Union Theological Seminary; James Weston Johnson, of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People; Ralph Judah L. Mages, of New York; and the Hon. William Z. Foster, secretary of the Trade Union Educational League, of Chicago; Miss Mary E. McDowell, of the University of Chicago Settlement, and the incorporators.

CHECK ON OIL FRAUDS

1100 Persons Said to Have Been Misled by Misrepresentations

Washington, July 19.—(By A. P.)—An order to discontinue "false representations" in connection with the sale of oil stocks and securities has been issued by the Federal Trade Commission against N. P. J. Cox, his wife, N. E. Cox and the Prudential Oil Company, all of Houston, Tex. The Prudential Oil and Refining, the Prudential Security Oil and the General Oil Companies all said to be controlled and controlled by the three respondents, also were named in the order.

A total of 1100 persons, the commission said in announcing the order today, were shown by its investigation and hearings "tendency to have been misled and deceived in the purchase of stock of the companies promoted and controlled by the respondents.

Representations said to have been made by these respondents in connection with the sale of stock and found by the commission to be false were that they possessed a "secret" or formula that had located or could locate oil beneath the earth's surface; that the Prudential Oil and Refining Company had "producing wells in the best of Humble's shallow territory and leases in the midst of Humble's deep producing district."

TWO KILLED IN RAIL CRASH

Engineer and Brakeman Lose Lives in Oklahoma Collision

Muskogee, Okla., July 19.—(By A. P.)—Two men were killed and more than a half-dozen persons were injured in a head-on collision between a passenger train and an extra freight train on the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway four miles east of Tulsa early today.

The dead were Edward Morris, Muskogee, engineer on the passenger train, and S. J. Robinson, Tulsa, brakeman on the freight train. The injured are passengers.

According to a report received at railway headquarters here the cause of the freight train misread their orders and were running on the passenger train's time.

FIGHTS COCAINE MENACE

French Academy Moves to Form International Organization

Paris, July 19.—(By A. P.)—An international organization for the control and prevention of the growing menace of cocaine is proposed by the French Academy of Medicine, it was announced today.

It is pointed out that large quantities of cocaine are being distributed to the world's markets by Germany, Central America and Mexico. Despite the arrests in France last year, the penalties have been insufficient to halt the traffic. The French Academy of Medicine has appointed a commission to frame regulations and to consult the proper authorities in the United States and elsewhere on the problem.

KILLS INTRUDER

Riverton Man Shoots Prowler Entering Home

Riverton, N. J., July 19.—Armed by the cracking of a door in his home shortly after 1 o'clock this morning Landon Stout, a twenty-two-year-old Negro, shot and killed a man whom he saw trying to enter the house.

When he picked up the dead man Stout recognized him as Harold Fisher, also a Negro, a friend of Stout's mother. He could give no reason for Fisher's presence at that hour of the morning.

P. and R. Coach Leaves Rails

Allentown, Pa., July 19.—Passengers were badly shaken up, although none was seriously injured, when one of the coaches of Philadelphia and Reading Railway train No. 2, Harrisburg to New York, left the rails last night and toppled over at East Penn Junction, this city. Railroad officials said the accident was due to spreading rails.
