This year the general feeling decided it was time to change their tactics, so led by Herbert Barber, the father of the idea, they put their heads together and formulated plans for a local amateur league, composed of six local clubs or organizations who wished to enter teams.

Letters were written to all the organizations, setting forth the idea, and it was explained that the league was to be out of the twelve approached, as follows: Lansdowne Country Club; Lansdowne Republican Club; Lansdowne Fire Company; Lansdowne High School; Knights of Columbus; Union Athletic Association; American Legion Post; Beta Theta Club; Fellowship Club and Pi Sigma Fraternity.

The rules of the league were simple. Any person who was a member of any of these organizations could play on the team, if you belonged to five or six teams, what difference did that make? And there are several players who do play with five and six different teams.

The ten teams were divided into two sections, called the twilight and the Saturday sections. In each section, each team played one another until a champion for each section was developed, and now these two champions meet on Monday for the championship of the league, regardless of the status of the New York Giants.

Take, for instance, Monday night's game. The Country Club has for pitcher Doc Cariss, the Penn varsity coach. "Hank" Lansdowne has for pitcher the former Swarthmore star and the idol of Lansdowne's baseball world for years, Doc Yates, former Penn player, and the Penn Fresh game plays second base. Jim Miller, former Penn player, plays third base, former American Association player, Bob Stratzel, in center field, captain and star of the Penn Charter team.

The legion has Charles Gilmore catching for them, one of the best catchers Penn ever turned out. Bob Livingston at first base and Governor Anderson in center field, two former Penn State stars. There is plenty of talent in the league, and if you want to see something that works like a well-oiled machine come out and see the Country Club infield work. In their last game they pulled in the prettiest double play you would want to see, with never a semblance of an error.

Big league baseball is a wonderful institution, but to see the great American game in its most interesting phase, follow the crowd to Lansdowne Monday night at 6:45 P. M.
