PROGRESSIVE LEAGUE BUSY

Cape May, N. J., July 22. — Old Cape May is continuing its forward march with the active aid of three sewerful factors, the Federal Governent, the State of New Jersey and the Progressive League.

There is great interest among the semanent residents, the many summer visitors and among yachtsmen and shippers in the ambitious program for Cape May's "port of entry," Cold Spring Inlet.

The Government is spending \$80,000 in keeping this snug harbor in up-to-the-minute shape, and in replacing the \$800 foot jetties. And Congressman Bacharach, stanch friend of Cape May, has a bill in Congress providing for an appropriation of \$50,000 more.

Cold Spring Inlet's 500 rippling scres of inland safety are, and have been for a long while, a tranquil haven for the many pleasure craft of the summer visitors, but now, more and more, they are becoming a port of call and a place of refuge for commercial shipping.

Steamships are putting in there to take on coal, gasoline and fuel oil, and Cape May is now a regular stop for a big boat which plies between Philadelphia and New York with passengers and freight, making two trips

Building New Roads

Even the Down Easters have dissevered the advantages of Cold Spring Inlet, for their fishing fleet has acquired the habit of running into Cape May from a hundred miles at sea, so it can ship from Cape May.

The State has helped Cape May to keep its banner, high by running fine highways deep into Cape May County, where they connect with hard-surfaced roads now being laid by Cape May itself. The resort's paving program is being carried out to this end.

A great deal of the spirit of Cape May is crystallized in the Progressive League, an incorporated body of 300 or more far-sighted business and professional men.

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This live organization is in its first year and is backing a plan to carry on a big advertising campaign. The leaders are also considering putting a field secretary on the road to bring national conventions to the resort, which has a convention hall on the beach.

Leonard Davis, a hotel man, builder and architect, is president of the league. Dr. J. R. Moon is vice president, Harry Settle is secretary and Dr. Herbert Lummis is treasurer. The Publicity Committee consists of R. H. Bpring, manager of the light and power company, as chairman; Albert R. Hand, publisher of the Star and Wave and the Wildwood Leader, and E. P. Stites.

Many of the leaders are discussing Mr. Davis, president of the league, as a candidate for one of the three Commissioners of Cape May. Cape May is administered under the commission form of government and the election will take place pext spring. will take place next spring.

For the two other commissionerships

For the two other commissionerships they are discussing, among others, Frank B. Mecray, hotel proprietor and an active factor in the league, and George P. Wentzel, who is now serving as one of the Commissioners and who comes up for re-election.

Women play their part in Cape May's progress and will also figure in the election. Among those referred to as leaders are Mrs. H. S. Rutherford, president of the Woman's Republican Club, and Mrs. Ralph Stevens.


