Harrisburg, July 24.—Interest amounting to \$11,300 was lost the Commonwealth through the failure of former State Treasurer Harmon M. Kephart to deposit promptly to the credit of the State checks received for tax payments from the Treasurer of Allegheny County.

The accountants review two transactions, one covering checks for \$20,277.87, in which it is contended that the checks were deposited to the personal account of John A. Bell, president of the Carnegie Trust Company, but which money eventually reached the State, and \$179,900.05, in which part appears to have been charged to accounts subject to check. The State in this instance eventually got the money.

Bell Ready to Testify
The report, which is one of the most complicated of the series, will be the basis of questioning when Mr. Lewis resumes the hearings in the audit this afternoon.

Will Alienate Voters
The Democratic cannot be anti-Catholic and anti-Jew in the South and have Catholic and Jewish votes in the rest of the country, while voters who have no racial prejudice will be disgusted by the prominence of the Klan in what has hitherto been the strongest element in the minority party.

Chicago, July 23.—A far greater danger threatens the American Federation of Labor than that of losing either or both of the strikes now in progress. It is the menace of Red revolution; the triumph of radicalism in its ranks, the attempts to graft upon it, or transform it into a species of communism that finds its best example in Soviet Russia of today.

It was a confession as well as a warning. A frank acknowledgment that there are agencies within the railroad workers' organization which seek to destroy them. They are led by communists. They are openly aided and abetted by influential officials of these organizations. They are lending their names openly and unblushingly to the movement.

Movement Filled With Hatred
