

GERMAN PATENTS SEIZURE DEFENDED

Senator Underwood Criticizes President for Action Against Chemical Foundation

CONSPIRACY CHARGE DENIED

By Associated Press. Washington, July 24.—The Chemical Foundation and its president, Francis P. Garvan, former Alien Property Custodian, who are being proceeded against by the government for the return of German chemical patents, were defended in the Senate today by Senator Underwood, who criticized President Harding and the Administration for the action taken against them.

Denying that there was any fraud, collusion or conspiracy in the acquisition of the German patents by the Chemical Foundation, Senator Underwood also commended the record of A. Mitchell Palmer, former Attorney General and Alien Property Custodian, in dealing with enemy alien property.

Opposes Claims Commission. Mr. Underwood opposed the Administration plan for a joint claims commission or another treaty to deal with the claims, declaring there was no necessity for further negotiations with Germany on the subject.

Quoting from Mr. Palmer's report on enemy alien property, Senator Underwood said that \$250,000 paid by the Chemical Foundation in securing rights to the 3,000 German chemical patents was "adequate" when the Government's right to use the patents was considered.

"This report," said Mr. Underwood, "effectively disposes of the charge that there was a fraudulent conspiracy on the part of those in the Alien Property Custodian's office who erected the Chemical Foundation and sold these patents to it. The charge has been repeatedly made that Mr. Garvan as Alien Property Custodian sold these patents to himself as president of the Chemical Foundation. The charge is also repeated and perfected before Mr. Garvan became Alien Property Custodian or had any thought of being appointed to that office."

Stating that former official statements of the Chemical Foundation plan were made in advance, Senator Underwood continued: "Conspiracies to defraud the Government are not committed in the open light of day. Conspiracies to defraud the Government are never reported to Congress by the conspirators in advance."

Thinks President Erred. "Now President Harding has directed the present Alien Property Custodian to demand a return of these patents from the Chemical Foundation to the Government. The President has committed himself to the doctrine that this sale was a violation of a trust. This is a mistake. The title of the patents was not in the Government and the Alien Property Custodian was not the trustee for the German owners."

German interests, Senator Underwood said, were seeking to have the latter construction sustained. If this was done, he declared, it would inevitably mean that the Germans will insist that the Government must return to the 'trusteeship' the wireless plants, patents, all patents on war materials and the great Hamburg, American and North German Lloyd terminals at New York which were sold for about \$7,000,000.

The Senate Judiciary Committee took up Senator Underwood's bill and appointed Senators Cummings, Iowa; Sterling, South Dakota, Republicans; and Overman, Democrat, North Carolina, as a sub-committee to continue further consideration.

MCCORMICK MEETS GANNA

Mrs. Walska going to Carlsbad to await divorce. Paris, July 24.—With the arrival of Harold F. McCormick from Chicago, the marital mix-up between Mrs. Ganna Walska and Alexander Smith Cochran, which was expected to culminate in a divorce settlement, heads international gossip.

Mrs. McCormick avoided the press and immediately sought Dudley Field Malone, who, with Mrs. Ganna's former attorney, the suffragist, and Mrs. Walska, took refuge in the opera singer's Paris home.

Mrs. Walska announced her intention of going to Carlsbad to await her divorce, and it is not presumed that Mr. McCormick will remain in Paris.

After-Dinner Tricks



No. 221—The Acrobatic Coin

The fingers of the left hand are bent inward, and a dime is laid upon the knuckle of the little finger. Suddenly, with no perceptible motion of the fingers, the dime turns a complete somersault or leaps in the air (Fig. 2).

The trick is done by the left thumb, which is secretly bent in, as shown in Fig. 2, under the tip of the little finger. The tip of the finger is pressed firmly against the thumb, and when the thumb is shot outward, it imparts a sudden force to the muscle of the little finger, which is sufficient to flip the coin. If the right hand is placed over the left thumb, as though to steady the hand, the sudden movement of the thumb will be completely concealed from view. The trick can be done when the coin is placed on other knuckles, but little finger is usually the most re-

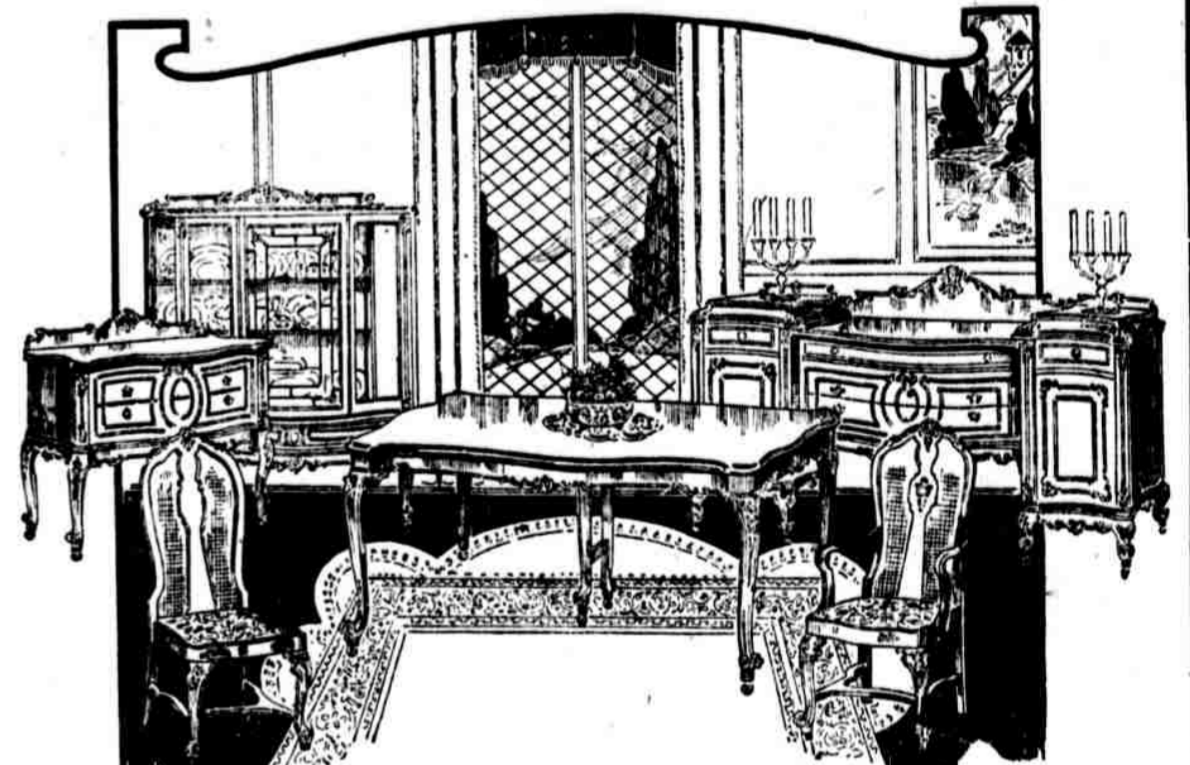

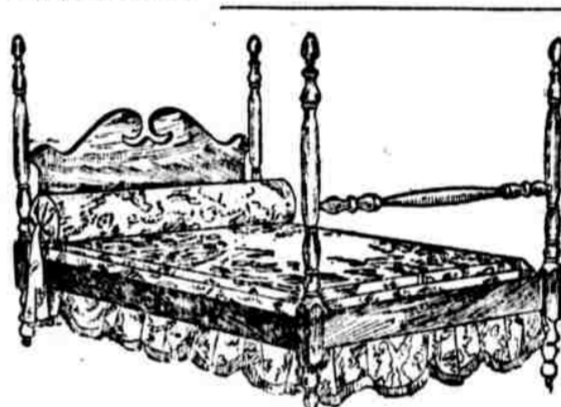

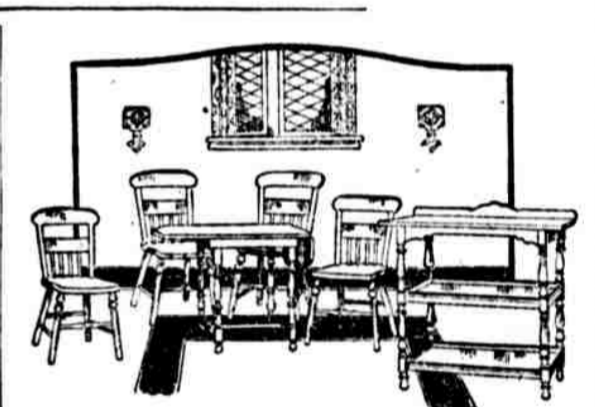
