

The latter challenges the spectator to toss his pack freely in the air, as high as the ceiling, and yet have the cards fall all together, only scattering when they strike the floor. When the spectator attents the fact the cards spectator attempts the feat, the cards begin to scatter before they reach the ceiling. The performer, however, gives his pack a careless toss, and the cards come down in a solid mass, until they

reach the floor.

To accomplish this feat, the performer previously tied a hair about the center of his pack. The hair is invisible a foot away, but it holds the cards as fively. cards as firmly as would a piece of string. When the pack hits the floor, the force of the fall breaks the hair, and the cards are scattered. The cards may be thoroughly examined, but the spectators will find no clue to the secret.


