MINE OWNERS IN PEACE MOVE

Small Producers in Western Pennsylvania Said to Be Negotiating Separate Pact

Evictions Set for Today Expected to Be Delayed. Priest at Montour Warns Strikers Against Reds—Troops Having Easy Time

By a Staff Correspondent. Washington, Pa., July 31.—Indications are that the United Mine Workers of America are planning a surprise on the soft coal operators who have been trying to place the bituminous fields of Southwestern Pennsylvania on an open-shop basis.

It was learned today that under the plans of John L. Lewis, national president of the union, the union leaders expect to split the coal producers who heretofore have been standing together. Then they hope to sign wage agreements with those operators willing to deal with the unions.

The unions have worked out plans by which they expect to induce the smaller companies to agree to the 1920 wage scale. The operators wanted to go back to the 1917 scale. The unions, it is learned, base their plans on belief that certain of the smaller operators cannot stand the strain of a prolonged fight for an open shop.

Mr. Lewis, it is understood, will present his plan at a conference in Philadelphia next Wednesday. Small Operators Restive. The Pittsburgh Coal Producers' Association controls the output in this region, and of this association, the Pittsburgh Coal Company, with about sixty mines, is the dominating factor, representing about 60 per cent of the tonnage of the association.
