RADIO RESULTS PLAN FOR REGATTA EVENTS

National Championship Returns to Be Broadcast as Far West as Denver—Announcements on Schuylkill to Be Made Through Amplifiers

CREWS from far sections of the Middle West, South and Canada, as well as from here, will be in the line-up for the national regatta on the Schuylkill, beginning Thursday, and the results of the contest will be broadcast throughout the East and Middle West.

Arrangements were completed to radio the returns at a meeting of the Schuylkill Yacht Club, which will be broadcast as far west as Denver. Spectators at the race also will benefit by the new arrangements.

By Associated Press San Jose, Calif., Aug. 1.—John Black, doughy little runner-up in the recent national open golf championship at Glenview, Ill., is playing on a course today for which he is seventy years old, and he is trying to avoid making it in less.

Lying on his back in a local hospital, the Skokie golf champion of 1910, is making a fight for his life as a result of an automobile spill last night which caused concussion of the brain and fractured several of his ribs.
