Supreme Knight Flaherty Shows Work of National Service Is Being Continued

WAR FUND FOR VETERANS

Special Dispatch to Evening Public Ledger. Atlantic City, Aug. 1.—Pointing to the 1921-22 record of the Knights of Columbus as a fulfillment of their pledge to the American people to maintain a times of peace the energy for national service which they displayed in time of war, Supreme Knight James A. Flaherty, of Philadelphia, in his annual report before the fortieth international convention today, struck the keynote of the sessions at the Ambassador Hotel, when he declared that the Knights would make their deeds and not their words the strongest argument for religious unity among Americans of all denominations.

The convention, excellent in numbers, the "America first" convention of the Knights in San Francisco last year, brought delegates representing the 800,000 members of the order from every State in the Union and every province of Canada, besides from Newfoundland, the Philippines, Hawaii, Alaska, Panama and Porto Rico. For the first time Mexico and Cuba have sent full State delegations.
