Professor Dies in Effort to Eliminate Deadly Germs Toronto, Aug. 1.—(By A. P.)—Prof. J. J. Mackenzie, head of the Pathological department of the University of Toronto, died today, a victim of his experiments to enable science better to cope with the deadly streptococci germs which, during the war, he saw ravage armies fighting in the Balkans. As a result of his experiments with the pus-forming bacteria, Prof. Mackenzie was attacked by acute ulcerated endocarditis.

He was born of Scotch origin in 1865 and was educated at the Universities of Toronto, Leipzig and Berlin. During the war he served at Saloniki. Mrs. J. J. Mackenzie, who is survived by several children, died at her home at 100 St. George street, Toronto.

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after-Dinner Tricks No. 228—A Pitcher and a Stick A stick, or cane, is passed through the handle of a large pitcher, and spectators are allowed to hold both ends of the stick. The performer then announces that he can take the pitcher from the stick, without the holders removing their hands, which he finally does. It would be impossible to do the trick in the way the audience thinks the performer means, that is to pass the handle of the pitcher through the stick. What the performer does is to lift up the pitcher and hold it so that the handle does not touch the stick. Thus the terms of the problem have been met, and with the performer actually

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
