WAR DEBT SCHEME HELD IMPOSSIBLE

Whole Cancellation Plan Hangs on U. S. Which Is Not Interested

GERMAN CRISIS GROWING

Washington, Aug. 2.—The State Department indicated today that the question of cancelling allied war loans was not in the hands of the Executive, but in those of Congress. It is not even likely to make a recommendation to Congress.

Thus the latest move of Europe to extricate itself from its difficulties ends like the previous one to open the resources of Russia on an impossibility. France will not reduce reparations unless Great Britain cancels its war loans. Great Britain will not cancel its war loans unless the United States also cancels its war loans. The United States will not cancel its war loans. No one supposes for an instant that Congress will regard with favor any proposition to reduce the foreign war indebtedness. Indeed, these shadowy claims are held out to the bonus-seekers as their best hope of obtaining additional money for their services during the war.

No Gain to Be Shown
From very first, when cancellation was proposed, no President Wilson in France has been in a position to be afraid to present this issue to the public. No direct gain to the country can be shown from cancellation and it is feared that the proposal would be highly unpopular. Our own attitude does not, however, differ from that of Great Britain. The administration there is afraid to go to the people with a cancellation of debts on which they could not show a direct gain against a loss. If it could show that its own debt had been reduced by cancellation by the United States to an extent about equivalent to the amount canceled by itself, it could face the public. Otherwise it is afraid.

This is practically the position of France. Germany is disintegrating economically. The mark reached the other day 600 to a dollar. It is rapidly approaching the value of the Russian ruble. It will decline on the news from England. The collapse of Germany involves dangers and responsibilities for France. The French Government is afraid to go to its people with a proposal to cut reparations, the only thing that can save Germany, unless it can show some kind of equivalent in the reduction of France's obligations to Great Britain.

We Have No Way Out
Thus the question comes around to us. There is no way in which we can show any equivalent, for no one can cancel any debt to us.

And there the logic of pulling Europe out of the mire stops. Only if the catastrophe which seems inevitable in Europe directly and unmistakably affects us and destroys our prosperity, can the issue of cancellation be presented to the American people.

A Political Question
As I have just shown, it is everywhere a political question. The J. P. Morgan mission to Europe regarding an international loan to Germany failed because it attempted to treat the rehabilitation of Germany as a purely financial question. It ran smack into the political side of the issue and stopped dead.

The British note has the merit of presenting it squarely in its true light as a political question. But once more a dead stop is reached. No politician in any country has the courage to go to his own people with it. He passes the responsibility over to his neighbors until it finally reaches the United States, where the understanding of Europe's plight is least and where the concern over it seems for the present negligible. The best hope of a solution seemed to be England, whose practical realism might have been expected to see the fully of looking for help where indifference was necessarily greatest. But Lord George's mission failed, as he failed at Paris and as he failed at London.

BOTTOMLEY LOSES SEAT

Former Editor of John Bull Is Expelled From House of Commons
London, Aug. 2.—By A. P.—Horatio Bottomley, former editor of John Bull, was yesterday expelled from the House of Commons by a vote of the members after the Speaker had read a long letter from him stating that he was neither guilty nor conscious of fraud and that he had been misled "the victim of an atrocious error of justice."
Bottomley was elected May 29 on twenty-three votes, charging a fraudulent conversion of about £150,000 (about \$275,000). He was sentenced to seven years' penal servitude. An editor of John Bull he carried on a sensational anti-American campaign.

The injured man was treated in the Cooper Hospital.
