NORTH PHILS WIN IN TEN INNINGS

Six successive hits in tenth prove undoing of Hockenbury. Play Terminal tonight

One month back it did not appear as though the North Phillies, for many years one of the leading independent teams in the city, were going to cut much of a swath in the semi-pro ranks this season.

But things are different now and at the present time this club is playing the best ball of any team in the city, bar none. This statement will be refuted, of course, but records are records, and that's what those submitted show.
