

Judge Monaghan Issues Warrant for Drug Suspect, Overruling Magistrate

WAS ACCUSED BY ADDICT

A bench warrant was issued today by Judge Monaghan for William Fitzgerald, who was accused last month of selling a nar cole drug, but who was discharged by Lingistrate Renshaw.

The Judge ordered Fitzgerald's arrest after questioning William Fries. on trial for the unlawful possession of drugs, who stated Fitzgerald sold him the narcotic.

Judge Monaghan also suggested that detectives investigate a restaurant on Ninth street near Ridge avenue, where Fitzgerald is employed and where Fries said he obtained drugs more than tifty times since last May. Detective Fouche, a Negro member

of the vice squad, testified that on July 19 he saw Fitzgerald place a small package in a pie box in front of the restaurant. Fries came along a minute later and removed the package, ac-cording to Fouche. The detectives said he arrested both men and that Magistrate Renshaw held

Fries for the Grand Jury and dis-charged Fitzgerald for lack of evidence.

"I don't understand that," remarked Judge Monaghan. "If you saw the man place this package in the pie box he certainly had possession of the drug and apparently is a seller." Turning to Assistant District Attor-

turning to Assistant District Attor-ney Gordon, the Judge continued: "Here is a restaurant where they have a man behind the counter who, it seems, furnishes druga to these unfor-tunate addicts. I think this place should be investigated by your detecshould be investigated by your detec-

Questioned by the Court, Fries said he had been "going straight" and working in Reading for several months and that he returned to Philadelphin Mny 5. He is engaged to be married to Ardmore Police Nab Allentown a Reading gtrl, he said.

The defendant said he had been buying drugs at the restaurant since May. He said he bought it from any one who would sell it.

"From whom did you buy it on this occasion?" asked Judge Monaghan. "From the man Magistrate Renshaw discharged." Fries answered. He added

that he was "broke" on that occasion. and that Fitzgerald trusted him for

half a fifty-cent package. The frequency of Fries' purchases glide made Judge Monaghan suspeet he was a peddler and not a user, but Fries in-sisted he never sold drugs. Fries pleaded guilty to having drugs






