

### SHORE HOTEL DRIVE RAISES \$600,000

Ocean City to Have Big New Structure Fronting on Beach

### RESORT HOLDS JUBILATION

Ocean City, Aug. 9.—The campaign to raise \$600,000 for Ocean City's new ocean-front hotel went "across" last night.

A total of \$542,000 in stock sold in this great civic enterprise was reported at the meeting. It is planned to erect a modern hotel of the type found in Atlantic City, at the cost of approximately \$1,000,000.

When the goal had been reached, became known automobile horns, fire bells, engine whistles and other noise-making implements were employed to spread the good news to residents of this resort, and huge bonfires were started on all parts of the beach.

Members of the organization, under the leadership of William F. Masser, general chairman of the campaign, staged a monster demonstration on the boardwalk at the close of the meeting. They kept step to the tune of the resort's popular song, "Ocean City All the Time."

The \$542,000 in stock was subscribed by the business men of Ocean City in a week of intensive selling. There are a total of 740 subscribers for the proposition, and the subscriptions range from \$100 to \$15,000.

There will be nine subscriptions today and the total amount will reach at least \$600,000.

The remainder of the money needed for the structure will be raised by bonds. Subscribers in thirty-six prominent Atlantic City hotels there. The hotel will be built by the Ocean Front Hotel Corporation, with capital stock of \$1,000,000 and shares costing \$100. The house will be fireproof, six or eight stories high, have 250 rooms, and will be built with stores on the boardwalk at 15th and 16th streets, and will be managed by J. Howard Sheum, lessee of the Normandie.

Work on the new hotel will be commenced in the near future, and it is anticipated that the new house will be ready to receive guests at the opening of the 1923 season.

With the accomplishment of this gigantic task the people of Ocean City have gone on record as being the first resort to finance a community hotel. The work done by the 160 men of the sales organization shows that their faith in Ocean City is complete.

The campaign for the raising of the funds was under the direction of the Hockenbury system of Harrisburg.

### BUFFALO STRIKERS LOSING

Court Decision Against Jitneys Aids Trolley Patronage

Buffalo, Aug. 9.—Buffalo street cars did the best business yesterday of any day since the carmen's strike began on July 1. Court orders for enforcement of the law against operation of jitney buses had the effect of adding the company patronage. The people rode on the cars in greatly increased numbers.

Many of the jitneys were still running on a surreptitious basis, but it was difficult to find out their destinations, as the police kept all route markings off the machines.

Some of the drivers desired programs intended to convey the destination without falling afoul of the law, but by the time a would-be passenger had the marks figured out the jitney would be in the next block. It is expected the ranks of the bus drivers will rapidly dwindle.

The city appealed to Justice Krass, of the Appeals Court, regarding the decision of Justice Poole's order pending hearing of an appeal. He reversed decision on the request after hearing arguments in the County Court, but announced Mayor Seligson's being something in his power to interfere with the operation of the street cars.

In his latest message on the Buffalo trolley strike situation, Dr. A. A. Martin said:

"With service rapidly approaching normal, we are now operating 298 cars."

### SHRINERS AT WILDWOOD

Key of City Presented to Visitors for Big Frolic

Wildwood, N. J., Aug. 9.—The Shriners today are the guests of the Wildwood Shrine Club. One thousand of them arrived on special train from Camden over the Pennsylvania Railroad. The Wildwood City Band serenaded them upon arrival. The key of the city was presented to H. C. Brown, secretary of the Crescent Shrine Club, by Mayor W. Conright Smith, but the actual handing of the key was done by James Himmelstein, four-year-old grandson of Noble Fred Himmelstein, of Camden.

The Camden Shriners brought their track band with them. A parade and ball game this afternoon formed a big part of the exercises. Shriners from Bridgeton, Millville, Atlantic City and other South Jersey points motored here this afternoon.

Potomac J. Howard Dudley and the officers of the Camden Shriners' Club will be dinner guests of the local Shriners at the Hotel Brighton tonight.

### BACKS TACNA-ARICA PACT

Chilean President Denies Treaty Exceeds Hughes Program

Santiago, Chile, Aug. 9.—(By A. P.)—Denial that the agreements signed in Washington by the representatives of Chile and Peru for settlement of the Ancon treaty dispute exceed the formula advanced by the American secretary of State is made in a statement issued by President Alessandri. After eulogizing the attitude of the American Government, the President says:

"The unalterable and respectful policy followed by the United States regarding free exercise of sovereignty by the South American countries is ample and effective guarantee of that great people, whose international reputation has been justly attained through the homage it pays to the high principles of justice and right."

### EX-KAISER WINS SUIT

Berlin Court Prohibits Presentation of Bismarckian Play

Berlin, Aug. 9.—(By A. P.)—Former Emperor William has won his suit, brought in a Berlin court, to prohibit the presentation on the stage or use of sale of Emil Ludwig's Bismarckian play, "The Fiesole."

William was joined in the suit by Frau von Hoettcher, widow of the minister of State in Bismarck's time. The court decided that the plaintiffs had a right to object to a stage performance or book portraying them personally.

### 14 RUSSIANS DOOMED TO DIE AS TRAITORS

Three Women Among Social Revolutionaries Sentenced  
Moscow, Aug. 9.—(By A. P.)—Fourteen of the thirty-four social revolutionists accused of high treason against the Soviet Government have been sentenced to death by the revolutionary tribunal. Among the condemned are several of those who turned informers.

Three of the other defendants were acquitted, and the remainder given prison sentences of from two to ten years.

The death sentences against twelve of the first group of defendants later were upheld by the Central Executive Committee, but an indefinite stay of execution was ordered upon the condition that the social revolutionary party cease its counter-revolutionary activity. Otherwise the sentenced leaders are liable to the court's judgment. Meanwhile all those sentenced to death or to various terms of imprisonment are to be held in strict confinement.

### Receiver Named for Steamship Co.

New York, Aug. 9.—(By A. P.)—A petition in involuntary bankruptcy was filed in Federal court against the New York-Naples Steamship Company, Inc., today by the Schubert & Trezor Company, Inc. The petitioning creditor has a claim for \$70,000. Judge Mayer appointed William Henkel receiver with bond of \$30,000.

### Lodge Files Nomination Papers

Boston, Aug. 9.—Papers in the interest of Senator Lodge, as a Republican candidate for re-nomination, were filed with the Secretary of State yesterday from each of the fourteen counties of the State. It was asserted that was the first time any candidate for public office in Massachusetts had qualified in every county. The only other candidate for the Republican nomination is Joseph Walker, of Boston.

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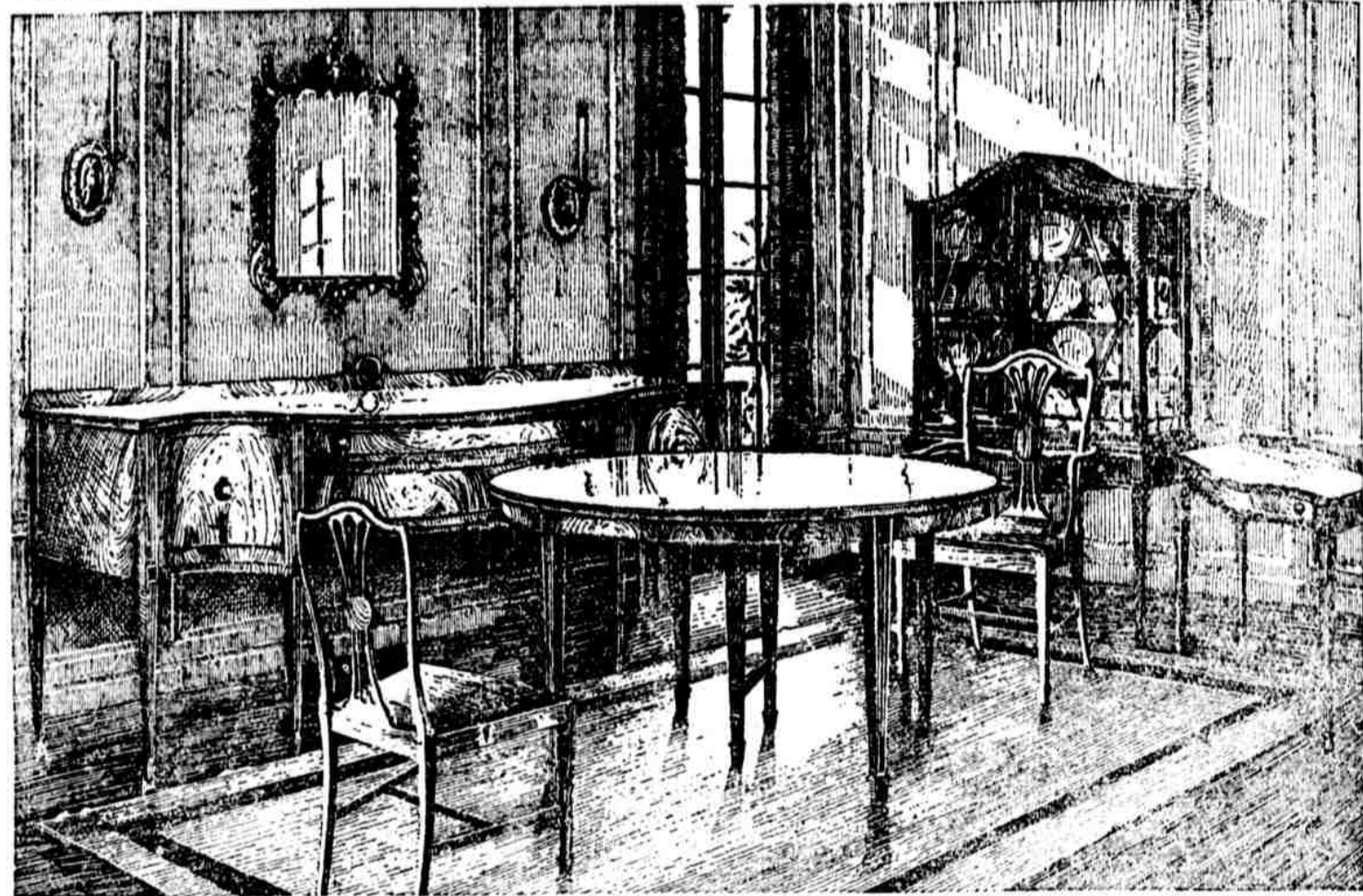
