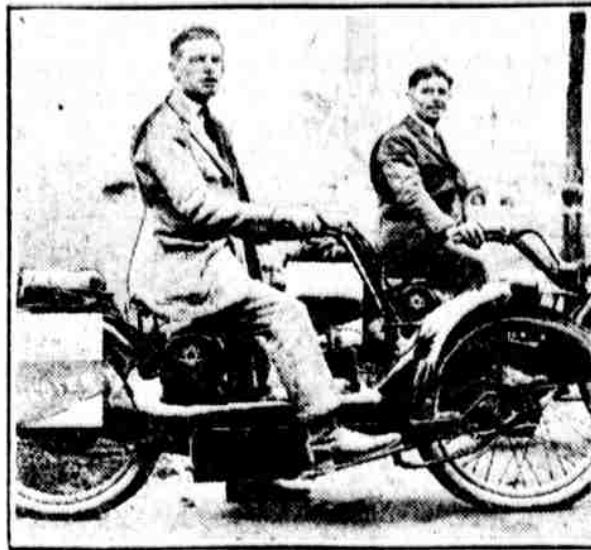

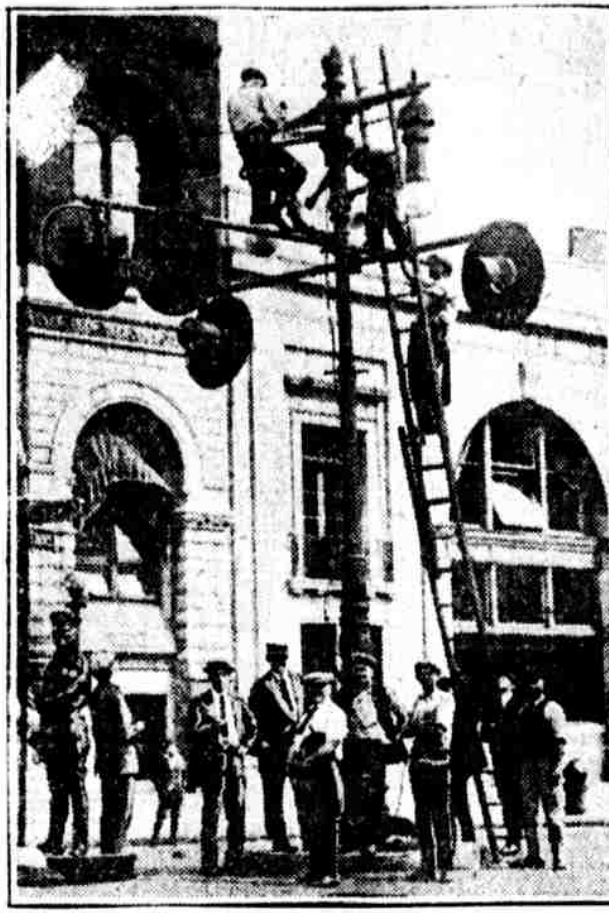

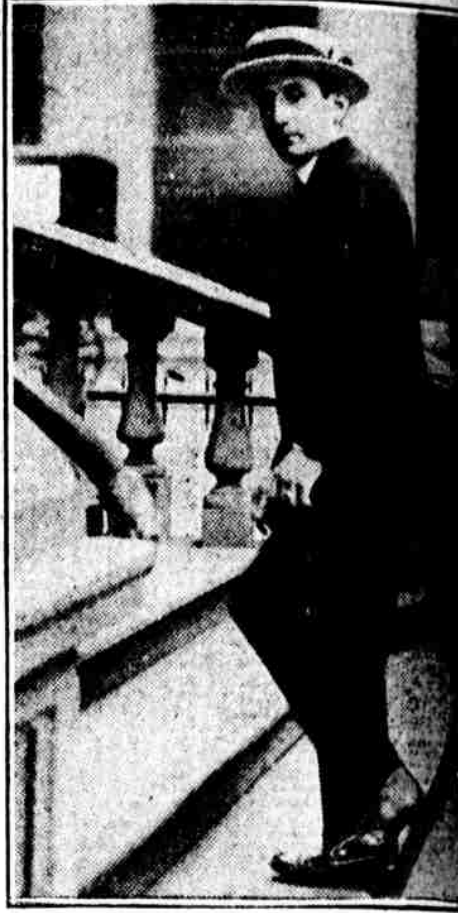

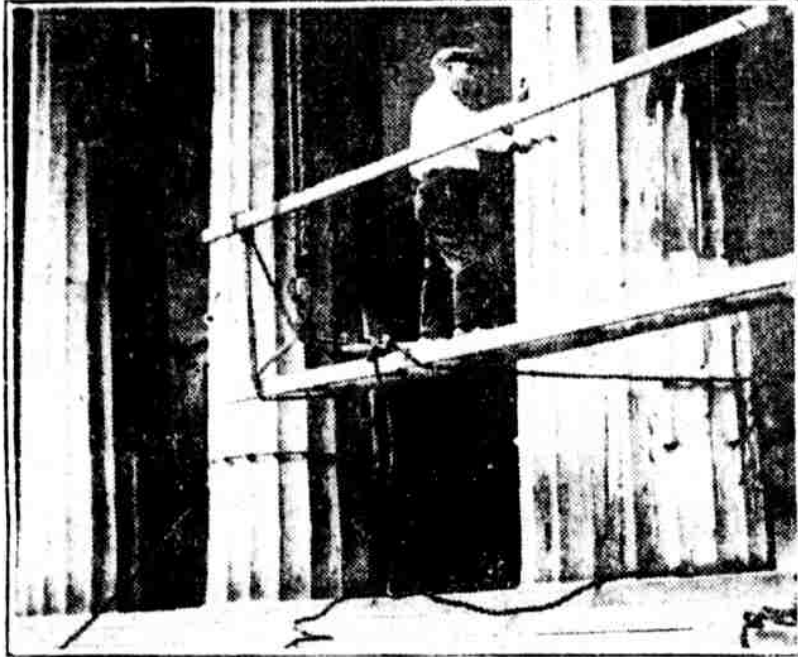
GOING TO YALE—MAYBE? Captain Mike Murphy, of the University of Washington crew, may switch his allegiance to Yale.

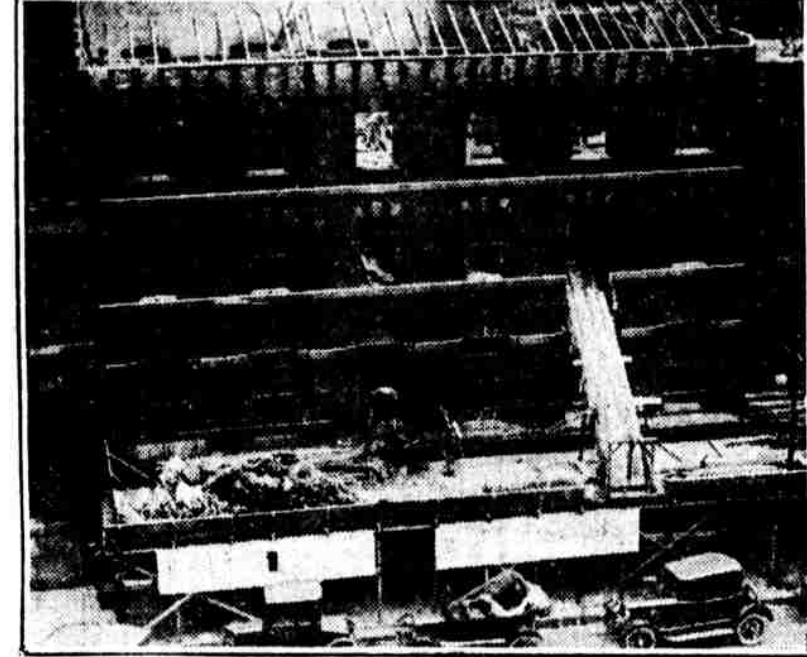

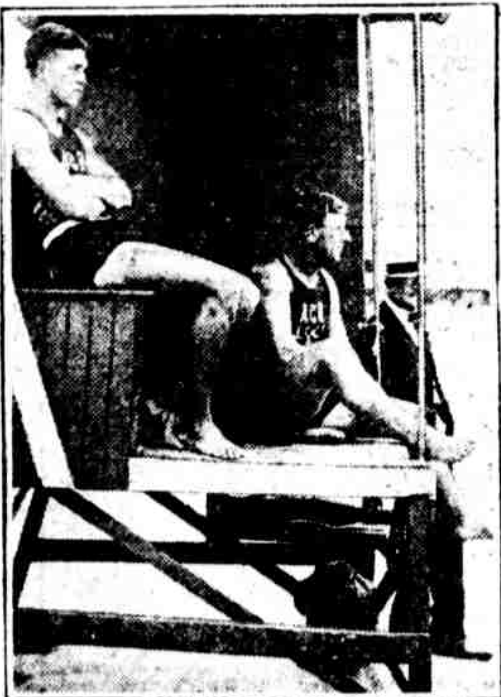
PASSING OF THE LITTLE HOTEL WILMOT. The structure, on South Penn Square, is being torn down to make way for modern office building.

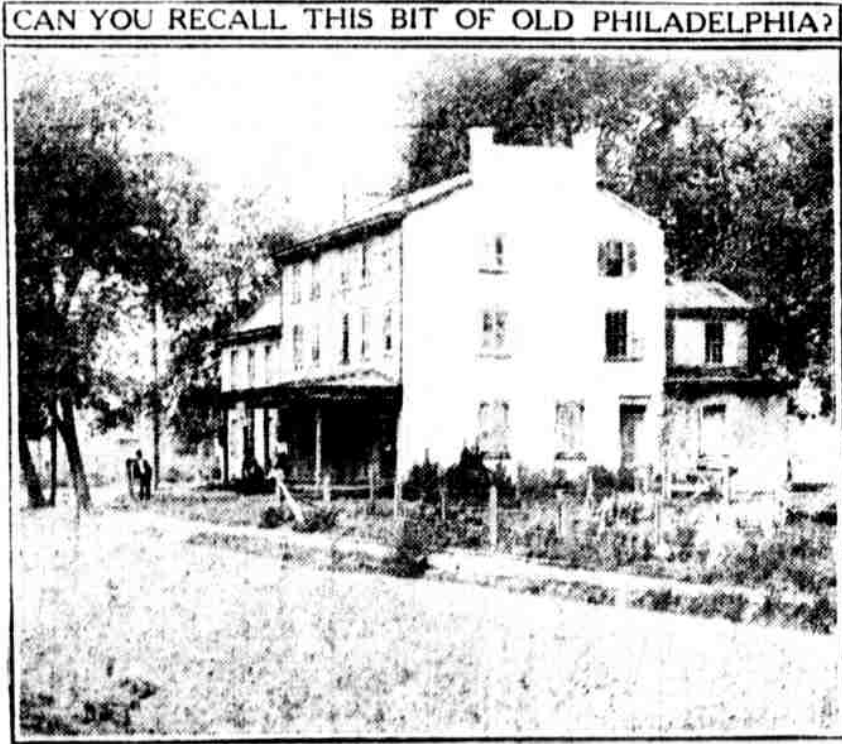
