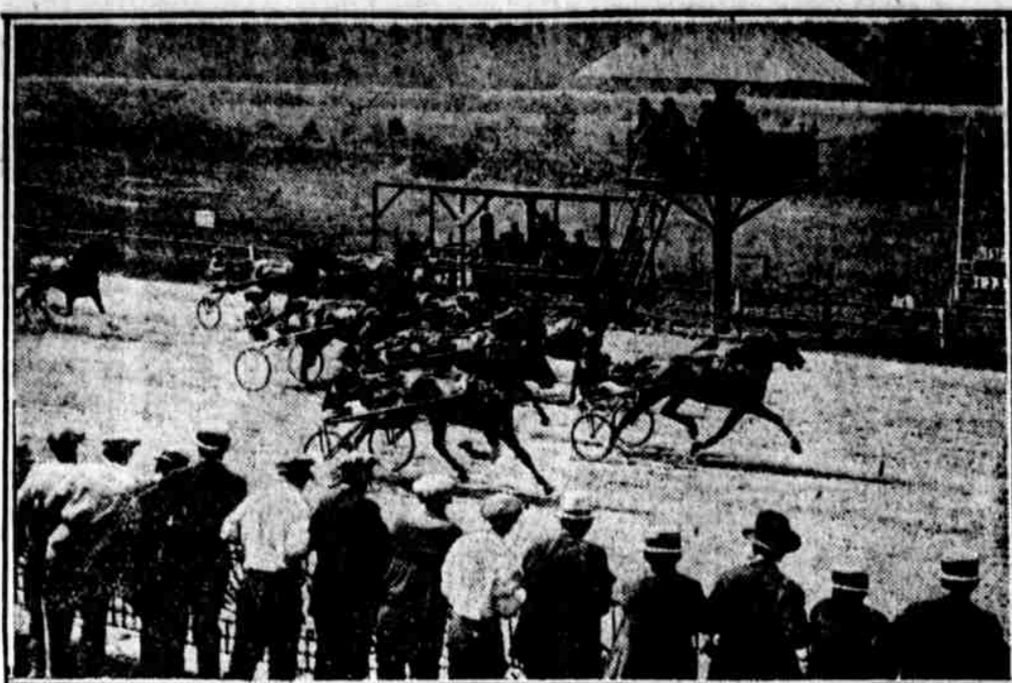




THEY'RE OFF. Five of the horses in the trotting dash, the fourth race of the Grand Circuit program at Belmont Driving Park



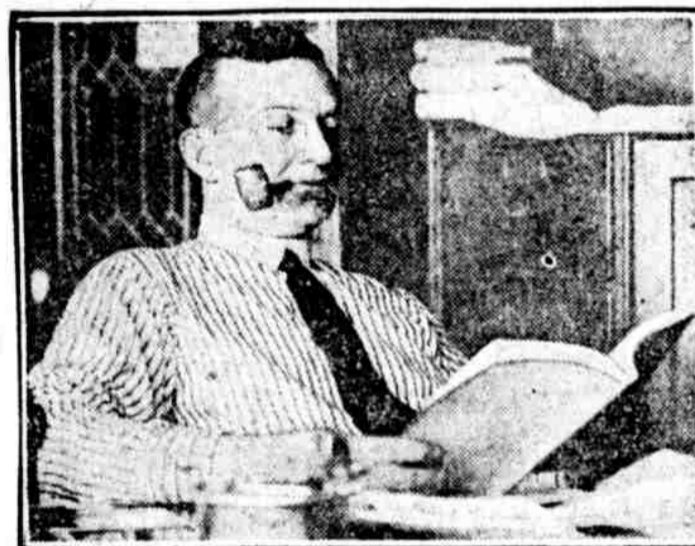

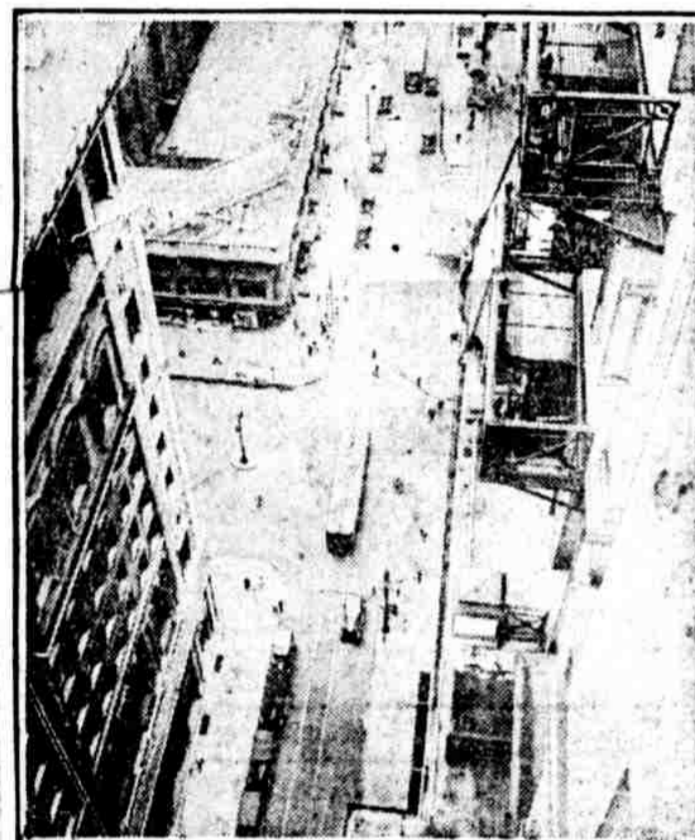

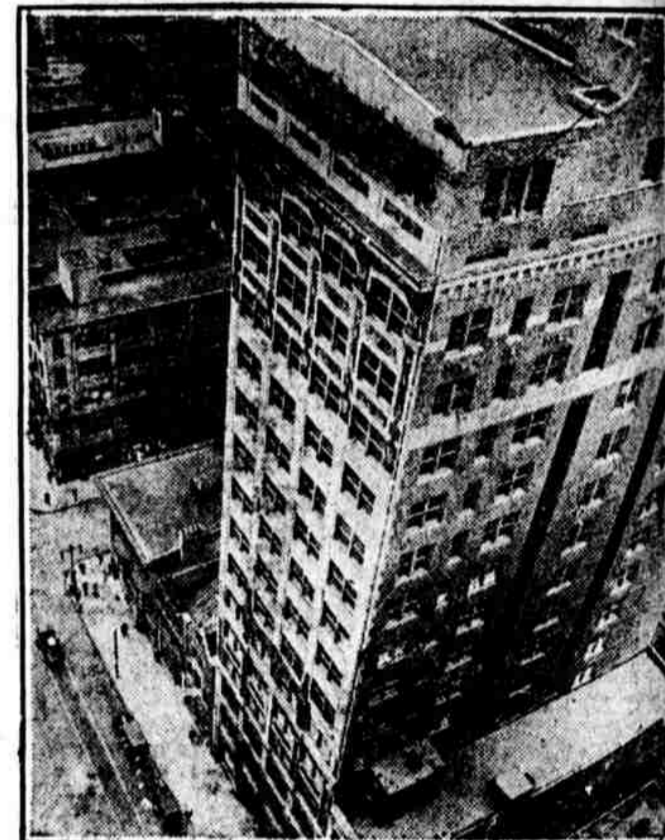
