

SKILLED, 20 HURT IN AUTO ACCIDENTS

Highland Park Man and Wife Die, Children Overhurt as Machine Overturns

GIRL, 17, LOSES LIFE

Three persons are dead and twenty others were more or less seriously injured as the result of automobile accidents in Philadelphia and vicinity yesterday.

Three small children were made orphans early Sunday morning when the automobile in which they were riding was wrecked near Chestnut, Md.

The family was motoring to Church Hill, Md., to spend Sunday with Mrs. Hancock's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Whaley.

The machine skidded and then turned over. Mr. Hancock and his wife were killed.

The children, four, eight and eleven years old, were riding on a rear seat. They escaped with slight bruises.

Mr. Hancock was general manager of the Frank J. Sheble Company, yarn manufacturer, at Thompson and Clearfield streets.

Relatives went to Chestnut and took the children and the bodies to the church, where funeral services will take place tomorrow.

Girl, Seventeen, Is Killed Hurred into the street from a sidewalk of a motorcycle in which she was riding when the vehicle was struck by an automobile at a street last night.

Police arrested Philip Tortorello, of 20 South Tenth street, and Mark Studin, a Negro, of 7240 Saybrook avenue.
