POOR JOHNSTOWN! BEER FLOOD BUNK

Lots of Near-Staff Sold to Guiltible Public for Real, Says Davis

RAPS MAYOR CAUFFIEL OFFERS TO WHIP DISTURBER

By a Staff Correspondent

Washington, Aug. 22.—Johnstown's "beer flood" was only a trickle. Reports of what happened were "greatly exaggerated."

Mayor Cauffiel, whose order to the brewers to sell real beer made him a national hero for a day with thousands of thirsty citizens, sought personal retribution, "in flagrant defiance of the Constitution of his country and State," which he had taken oath to respect.

These are high lights in a personal report made to Prohibition Commissioner Haynes today by John T. Davis, Prohibition Director of Pennsylvania, Director Davis, summoned here by Haynes to tell about the Johnstown overturn, spent the day at "dry" headquarters in conference with his superiors.

He declared Johnstown has come back to "normalcy" and is again drinking Volstead here under the misapprehension that it contains more than half one per cent alcohol.

Calls Situation Satisfactory

"The liquor situation at Johnstown is under full satisfactory control of a new and efficient group of men," Davis asserted, "assisted by outstanding, experienced agents. There has been no flood of real beer, sensational newspaper reports notwithstanding. A lot of near-beer was passed off as real, but it was not the drinking public, as usual, was deceived."

"In other words, all is not gold that glitters, nor is all beer that foams, and this is especially true at Johnstown," Davis declared.

Director Davis defended his suspension of Group Chief Stiffel, removed following Mayor Cauffiel's real-beer order. The deposed agent, who has since fixed the interest of some of the "wet" congressmen in his efforts to win reinstatement, has not shown up at prohibition headquarters yesterday and spent most of the day at the Capitol, Commissioner Haynes declared today he had not seen nor heard from him.

It was indicated at "dry" headquarters that Stiffel, even if retained in the service, will not be reassigned to the Johnstown-Altoona district.

It was also disclosed definitely today that John Excelsior, enforcement chief at Pittsburgh, has been detailed to Providence, R. I., to clean up that State. The State director and all his assistants have been detailed, and Excelsior and an entirely new staff placed in charge by Haynes' orders. It was stated by Commissioner Haynes that Excelsior will resume his work in west Pennsylvania when Rhode Island has been nipped up.

Activity in Pennsylvania

Reporting on general conditions in Pennsylvania today, Director Davis said:

"July was a month of great activity along enforcement lines and August will prove the most successful month we have ever had in Pennsylvania so far as constructive activity is concerned. We are building up a force of energetic, able and trustworthy men, who are proving by their activities and accomplishments that they have a real interest in their duties and can be depended upon to do their best. We give new appointees adequate instructions so that they are able to produce the best results within the shortest period of time, and all agents are given every assistance and encouragement so that we now have co-operation which inspires confidence and adds materially to the attainments of the entire organization."

"Special attention is being given to the alcohol problem which has arisen in this State, and steps have been taken to curb violations occasioned by the sale of alcohol, both grain and demerara, as a substitute for whisky."

"The attitude of the press is favorable, and juries, both Federal and State, are impartial, imposing severe sentences in every case where the evidence warrants."

Director Davis said he was enthusiastic over headway made in enforcement work since the beginning of the fiscal year, and plans a season of concerted activity over the entire State during the coming months.

K. K. K. STARTS RIOT IN POLITICAL RALLY

Former Governor of Texas Jeered When He Attacks Members of Order

OFFERS TO WHIP DISTURBER

Dallas, Tex., Aug. 22.—While Earle B. Mayfield, candidate for the Democratic nomination for United States Senator, was explaining his stand as to union labor at Houston last night, his opponent, former Governor James E. Ferguson, was the center of riotous scenes at Houston, about seventy-five miles away.

The trouble began when Mr. Ferguson started to speak against the Ku Klux Klan, of which he is an opponent. As he started to speak part of his audience began leaving amid catcalls and jeers. The audience was finally quieted after many had left the building, and Mr. Ferguson continued his speech. He referred to those leaving the hall by saying:

"The tumult ended with the former Governor inviting a member of the audience down to the front where, he said, he would whip him in five minutes in more ways than a country boy can whip a nigger."

"The invitation was pronounced by a remark flung at the speaker by the men in the audience. Mr. Ferguson then devoted a great part of his address to talking against the Ku Klux Klan.

In Beaumont Mr. Mayfield answered a charge made by Mr. Ferguson that he was against organized labor. Mr. Mayfield made the direct statement that he was opposed to any organization or movement that would destroy union labor. He compared his record as to labor with Mr. Ferguson's."
