

BIGGEST INSURANCE PAID IS \$1,517,820

Twenty-four Companies Join to Cover Milwaukee Man's Policy

WANAMAKERS HEAD LIST

New York, Aug. 23.—The largest life insurance payment by companies in the United States or Canada during the last year was made to the beneficiaries of Ferdinand Schlegler, of Milwaukee, Wis., according to today's issue of the Insurance Press. The payment amounted to \$1,517,820. The risk was distributed among twenty-four companies.

Heirs of Isaac Kaufman, Pittsburgh department store owner, received the second largest payment—\$800,000. The highest insurance carried by a Canadian was that of Senator Frederic Nicolls, of Toronto, who had \$380,000.

An effort to compile a list of more than a score of the highest insurance holders in the United States, it was further stated, indicated that Rodman Wanamaker, with \$4,500,000, and his father, John Wanamaker, department store pioneer, with \$3,000,000, were the most heavily insured. It is presumed that the number of individuals who carried more than \$1,000,000 worth of life insurance is fifty or more.

Of the sixty-three largest insurance payments made in 1921 in the United States and Canada, eight of the holders, or about 12 per cent, lost their lives in automobile accidents.

The total life insurance distributed in 1921 in the United States and Canada was put at \$1,170,722,000. Some of the other high insurance payments follow:

William P. Snyder, Pittsburgh: \$508,000; steel manufacturer.

George E. Keith, Brockton, Mass.: \$373,170; president George E. Keith Company, manufacturers of shoes; died of myocarditis.

John D. Lloyd, Altoona, Pa.: \$301,500; banker.

Albert H. Wehr, Baltimore, Md.: \$150,000; lawyer and mechanical engineer.

Frederick H. Parkhurst, Bangor, Me.: \$101,408; Governor of Maine.

Joseph Knigin, Moorestown, N. J.: \$101,375; lawyer.

Colonel Frederick W. Galbraith, Jr., Cincinnati: \$81,000; National Commander of the American Legion; killed in automobile accident; also carried over \$200,000 of accident insurance.

WOMAN SAYS HUSBAND HAD SPY SEND WARNING

Took Actress Abroad, She Claims. Leaving Friend on Guard

New York, Aug. 23.—In a suit for divorce Mrs. Norman R. Sterne alleged yesterday that her husband, a wealthy importer and exporter living in New York, took her to Europe last year to inform her how she was receiving news of his conduct with another woman with whom he is alleged to have gone to Europe.

Mrs. Sterne applied to Supreme Court Justice May, of Brooklyn, to confirm the report of Allan S. Locke, referee, who recommended that she be awarded \$75 a week alimony, \$750 counsel fee and \$700 for expenses, pending trial of her case.

The wife asserted her husband went to Europe in the fall of 1921, ostensibly for business, but accompanied by Helen R. Meyers, formerly an actress. She further alleged that while Frank Inhardt, connected with Sterne's firm, posed as a family friend, she discovered he was used by her husband to ascertain if she knew of his actions abroad.

Mrs. Sterne said Inhardt, in a letter forwarded to her, told her that her husband sent Miss Meyers to Europe to look after her on trips, and had put \$40,000 in her bank accounts in a year.

BOY ADVENTURER FOUND IN GARBAGE CAN IN PARIS

Father at Home in Binghamton Not Worrying About Him

Paris, Aug. 23.—When fourteen-year-old Herman Jasper ran away from his home in Binghamton, N. Y., for a personally conceived tour of Europe, he did not visualize his journey as ending in a garbage can on the Boulevard des Capucines.

But there a policeman found him wrapped in peaceful slumber yesterday, and now Herman is awaiting arrangements to return home to Binghamton.

The boy crossed the Atlantic as a stowaway on the liner Finland. He covered during the voyage he was detained at Antwerp for deportation, but escaped, going to Brussels and thence on to the French coast. He then he was again captured by police, but once more showed his dashiness, finally reaching Paris where he was waiting a chance to visit the battlefields.

LA FOLLETTE FOUGHT FOR 8 MONTHS TO SAVE SON

Answers Critics Who Denounced His Absence From Senate

Milwaukee, Aug. 23.—Answering a public attack made upon him by political opponents, who charge he was absent from several important roll-calls in Congress during the war and had neglected his duties, Senator Robert La Follette, in an address before more than 4000 men and women at Eau Claire, invited his enemies to make what they could out of that issue.

"I feel confident," declared La Follette, "that their own bomb will explode under them. I was absent from Congress for a time. I don't know whether you heard of it, but for eight months I carried a boy—my boy—in my arms night and day. The best physicians in the country had given him up, but I fought on. I won that fight finally, and I went poor doing it."

"For eight months I never changed my clothes except to take a bath, and during that whole period I never slept in bed. It was during that time I was absent from Congress, but I was fighting for the life of one of my loved ones. They are welcome to that issue."

CURTISS TO TEST GLIDER

Will Try Motorless Flying From Sea Within Two Weeks

New York, Aug. 23.—An attempt to rise from the surface in a motorless glider will be made at Great South Bay within the next two weeks by Glenn H. Curtiss, pioneer in American aviation, it was announced yesterday by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce.

The glider, of a new type of construction, is being assembled at the Curtiss Aeroplane and Motor Corporation works at Garden City. It is made of wood, duraluminum, which is a very light metal, and silk. It weighs 150 pounds when empty.
