Likes to Sleep In bed at 8:30 last night, Loughran was up at 6 o'clock this morning. Unaccompanied, the South Philadelphia pride walked from his home on Ritter street to the hotel in Longwood Park and then went downtown, taking in a movie on Market street. Loughran is a moving-picture fiend.

At 1 o'clock Tommy took his usual breakfast, and then, being called at 2 o'clock, Tommy is a sound sleeper and, yawning, suggested that he be permitted to slumber some more, but he had the advice to get up. "Next to boxing," grinned Loughran, "I love sleep, and you can let I get plenty of it—at every opportunity." Several of the fans came over from New York this afternoon for tonight's bout. Among the visitors was Frank Flanagan, representative of Tex Rickard, who no doubt will report to the New York promoter which of the principals "looks best" to him.

Rickard has been trying to match both Middleweight Champion Johnny Barry and Harry Greb, light-heavyweight champion, for respective title fights. As Loughran is in line for each of these contests, negotiations between Rickard and Smith, already having been started, a clean-cut victory for the South Philadelphia tonight will mean a lot.

Tunney, who lost the light-heavyweight title to Greb, has been canvassing for a return date with Harry Greb, and has future plans in his efforts to win decisively.

Celebration Arranged All South Philadelphia is preparing for a gala occasion. The downtown fifteen-year-old pride is to get a chance to take another step toward the light-heavyweight championship, and the folks in the southern section of the city feel certain that "their Thomas" will give them a "fish blood" and come through to victory.

The fact that Tunney is the former American title-holder doesn't mean anything to the downtowners. They feel that T. Fitzpatrick, who whip any one who will step into the ring with him, and everything is all set to celebrate Loughran's victory.
