AIRMEN NEAR DEATH IN PLUNGE AT SHORE

Hydroplane Hits Wires and Drops at Atlantic City

Affantic City, Aug. 26.—Three occupants of an hydroaleplane had a nar-row escape from death when the craft struck the wires of the Atlantic and Suburban Railway and fell here this noon. The machine was wrecked. Captain Jack Fitzsimmons, twenty-four years old, of 523 North Rhode Island avenue, a wounded war veteran; Albert Clark, the mechanician, and Albert Clark, the mechanician, and William Thompson, associated with their local flying station, were plunged into the waters on the cast side of the Florida avenue drawbridge.

Anthracite Miners and Operators Will Get Another Chance

By Associated Press Washington, Aug. 26.-The Federal Administration was preparing to bring the anthracite coal and rail strike situations to an early culmination with Federal operation of the anthracite mines and some of the railroads necessary to protect the public welfare. President Harding today received

report on the recent New York negotia. tions for settlement of the rail strike. Senator Watson, Republican, Indiana, who has been one of the foremost advisers of the Executive in the railroad situation, called at the White House after talking by long distance telephone with T. De Witt Cuyler, chairman of the Association of Railway Executives, and Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific Railway. The Indiana Senator was accompan-

ied by John T. Adams, chairman of the Republican National Committee, and their visit was substituted for an appointment Alfred P. Thom, general counsel of the executives' association, had with the President.

Seniority Still an Issue Neither Mr. Watson nor Chairman Adams, prior to their conference, would comment on the proposal being considered by the President looking toward a request for Congressional authority to take over some railroads and anthracite mines unless there is an improvement in those industries within a reasonable time. He indicated, how-ever, that railroad executives had manifested considerable interest in what the Administration purposed to do with the troublesome question of seniorits if it should be deemed necessary
