Mrs. Elizabeth Sabott Thought Joseph Buckley Wanted to Get Her \$189

TEST HER SANITY

Mrs. Elizabeth Sabott, who is necused of the murder of Joseph Buckley at her bungalow at Girard Point last Thursday, was held without bail to await the action of the Grand Jury today by Coroner Knight, at the inquest. At the same time the District Attorney ordered the woman examined as to her sanity. She was returned to Moyamensing Prison.

Throughout the inquest the woman. who is forty years old, sat in the prisoner's dock and glared around the room in a frightened way, muttering to her-'self. When the verdict was pro-nounced and court officers approached to lead her away, she screamed: "He wants my \$189, he wants my \$189."

She was removed with difficulty.

Buckley's body was found in the Grard Point marshes. He had bled to death from a number of stab wounds. He was fifty years old, and lived near the woman, at Twenty-fourth and Mag-
