

NURSE DESCRIBES HALLOR KIDNAPPING

Actress in Auto Seized L. Lawrence Weber, Jr., in Park, Court Is Told

CUSTODY STILL UNSETTLED

New York, Aug. 29.—The custody of L. Lawrence Weber, Jr., remained unsettled yesterday after his parents, through their attorneys, had assailed each other's character before Supreme Court Justice Burr.

The boy's father is a theatrical manager and producer and a nephew of Joe Weber, the comedian. He and Miss Edith Hallor, the boy's mother, were married in 1918. Weber obtained a divorce in Buffalo and Miss Hallor, well known on the stage and in the movies, was married to John Dillon, motion-picture director.

Weber's decree awarded to him the custody of his son, but Mr. Dillon alleges he subsequently entered an agreement under which each would have the boy six months of the year. Weber's failure to deliver the boy to her at the expiration of his six months' period caused Mrs. Dillon to kidnap him from his nurse in Central Park.

Miss Louise Gerlich, the nurse, told how two women suddenly jumped from behind bushes, seized him and put him in an automobile, James Hughes, employed by Weber to guard the boy in just such an emergency, was with Miss Gerlich.

"There were some men in another automobile and the cars sped away while Hughes gave chase, calling for aid," said Miss Gerlich.

Weber testified yesterday that he had "small private stock," but denied the accusation of his former wife's counsel that he drank to excess.

A clerk in the Hotel Laurelton, where Miss Hallor once resided, alleged he had seen her come into the hotel intoxicated on several occasions. At the previous hearing Justice Burr awarded temporary custody of the child to Supreme Court Justice Marcus, of Buffalo, who is staying with Weber at the Idaho Apartments. In adjourning the hearing until September 13, Justice Burr continued the temporary arrangement and directed that Mrs. Dillon be permitted to visit her son at all reasonable times.

On the stand Weber testified that Miss Hallor's \$250,000 breach of promise action against him in 1918 was withdrawn when he married her.

Unwise to Buy "Dudley Grange" for Park, Says City Solicitor
