Boston, Mass., Aug. 30. AMERICA retained the doubles championship of the United States at the Longwood Cricket Club, Chestnut Hill, when the defending champions, Vincent Richards and myself, defeated Gerald L. Patterson and Pat O'Hara Wood, the Australian Davis Cup challengers, by the score of 4-6, 6-3, 6-4.

Three other national titles were won when Arnold W. Jones, of Providence, R. I., crushed Lewis White, of Austin, Texas, 6-0, 6-0, 6-1. David O'Loughlin, of Pittsburgh, defeated Malcolm Hill, of Boston, 7-5, 6-3 and Mrs. Mollie Bjurstedt Mallory and I beat Miss Wynne Williams and Howard Kinsey in California, 6-4, 6-3, in the junior and boys' singles and the mixed doubles, respectively.

The magnificent showing of Vincent Richards throughout the entire match should insure his selection for the Davis Cup doubles next Saturday at Forest Hills. In every department of the game the Yankees had showed exceptional control and brilliancy.

CADDIES HOLD UP GOLFERS, IS CHARGE

Bag Toters Accuse Players of Cheating in Scores and Demand Hush Money

Chicago, Aug. 30.—The Westmoreland Country Club is in a turmoil over an investigation by the Board of Governors into charges that golf caddies have been exacting bribes from club members and that caddies have accused golfers of cheating in their scores.
The investigation has been on for two weeks, it was learned. When the name of William P. Kent, secretary-treasurer of the North American Life Insurance Company, was used in connection with it, he said:
"You bet there have been charges and there are going to be more. Caddies have been a nuisance on the golf course. They accuse members of cheating in their scores, and if the members don't come across with a \$5 bill they threaten to report. A caddy tried that on me and I told him plenty. The so-called charges are a result of that instance."
