HONOR ZION MANDATE MUST REPAIR HIGHWAY

The solemn strains of "Hatikva"—Hebraic anthem of hope—thousands of Jews marched today to celebrate the opportunity given them by the League of Nations to found a national homeland in Palestine.

Along the line of march on Fifth street south of Walnut fluttered countless American flags and the six-pointed blue star of the Jews.

By the curbs stood ancient women, too old to march, with their black shawls wrapped tightly about their heads, in their hands the Jewish emblem.

At Independence Square, where some of the hands played "America" and some of the Hatikva, a small committee walked to the shrine of the Liberty Bell.

Here Rabbi B. L. Levinthal, of Philadelphia, offered up a prayer in Hebrew. The parade formed Sixth and Lombard streets. Led by Marvin O. Levy, grand marshal, the long line followed along Fifth street to Walnut, and out Walnut to Broad street.

Just as a prisoner before United States Commissioner Manley was about to be given permission to sign his own bail bond and go to liberty today, because he had a wife and two children, a man arose dramatically in the rear of the room.

Raymond Newlin testified that the checks in question had been sent from the Coatesville National Bank, same into court today in an effort to force the United States Attorney's office to show its evidence.

Both Newlin brothers were brought from Moyamensing Prison, where they are kept in widely separated cells, to appear before Judge Dickinson.

After the letters of administration had been granted Mrs. Fryer unexpectedly found a slip of paper in a drawer at home. It was dated January 21, 1921, and written in pencil in her husband's handwriting. It read:

GEN. U. S. GRANT'S DAUGHTER DEAD

Nellie Jones, One of Few White House Brides, Victim of Paralysis
