Measure Giving \$4,000,000,000 to World-War Veterans Now Goes to Conference

PARTY LINES WIPED OUT WHEN FINAL VOTE IS TAKEN

Senator Lodge Declares Payments Will Not Prove Burden to Nation

EXECUTIVE VETO FORECAST

Treasury Department Expects President Will Refuse to Sign Enactment

Washington, Aug. 31.—The \$4,000,000,000 Soldiers' Bonus Bill was passed by the Senate today by a vote of 47 to 22, in which party lines were wiped out.

LODGE SUPPORTS BILL

The day's discussion in the Senate was opened by Senator Lodge, who argued that the Government owed compensation to the soldiers and disputed the theory that the proposed bonus would prove too great a burden on the treasury.
