

TOIL ON TO REACH ENTOMBED MINERS

Comrades Dig Away in Vain Hope of Rescuing Men Buried Mile Below

INTENSE HEAT IN SHAFT

Jackson, Calif., Aug. 31.—(By A. P.) Fire in the shaft of the Argonaut gold mine, in the lowest reaches of which forty seven miners have been imprisoned since Sunday, is out, but that fact brought no more hope for releasing the men alive. The heat in the shaft is so intense flames may break out again at any moment, and at the earliest it would be five days before entrance to the mine could be gained through it.

Rescue teams hurried frantically today to cross the three miles of passage from the shaft. The spadeworker of the Argonaut mine drifts to the shaft and open air where several lumps might drink down of fresh breeze.

Two more thousand passages which workers are endeavoring to cut from the Kennedy, an adjoining mine, while the third was through the shaft of the Argonaut itself.

A second rescue came on a level 200 feet below the group that has worked since Monday, burrowing from the 2000-foot level of the Kennedy mine toward the Argonaut. This level, which had made considerable progress, it will be a long way, through 500 to 600 feet of loose dirt, before a 100-foot wall of solid slate is reached.

The workers struck a cavern last night, showing their progress. They estimated there would be between 50 and 100 feet more of rock and dirt to be cleared.

Amusement that the flames were subdued added hope to the rescue teams who wait in shafts at the entrance of the pit and gave new strength to the grim workers burrowing at the rock walls in subterranean passages. Rescue workers descending the shaft this morning got as far as the 2400-foot level in two days and went 100 feet further on ladders. They found the smoke greatly diminished.

The waterworks at the side of the shaft still were too hot to touch.

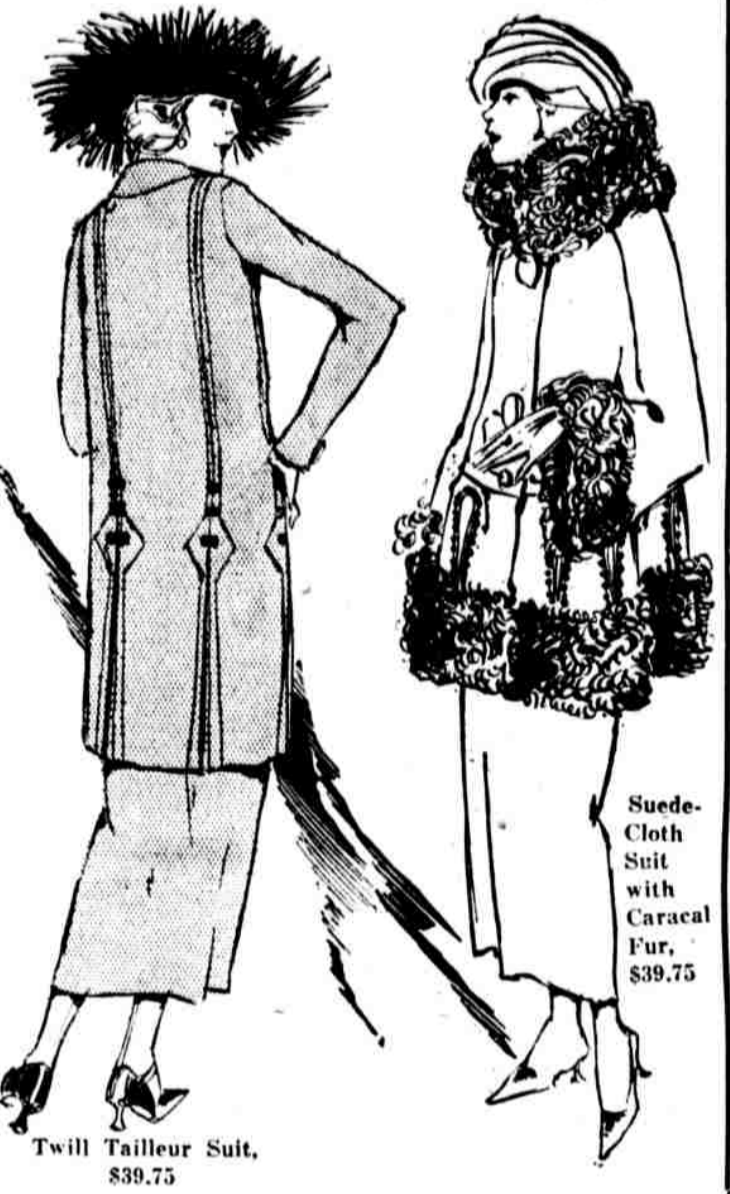
