Mayor Donnelly Is Principal Speaker at Waterways Convention in Portland, Me.

AWAIT FEDERAL ACTION

Special Dispatch to Evening Public Ledger, Portland, Me., Sept. 14.—A twenty-five foot channel between Philadelphia and Trenton was advocated by Mayor Frederick W. Donnelly, of Trenton, in an address at the fifteenth annual convention of the Atlantic Seaper Waterways Association here today.

Charles K. Hammett, who is here with the Trenton delegation, spoke in favor of the development of a great national historic park where George Washington crossed the Delaware. Election of officers and the choice of the next convention city will be made tomorrow.

Our trans-State ship canal project is one of the most vital and important links of the entire intra-coastal system, has advanced as far as New Jersey can forward it without the aid of Federal Government.

The New Jersey Ship Canal undertaking has the approval of our State's congressional representatives, and I look to them to prod on the powers that be for the early commencement of this work.

Trenton is now reaping the full fruit of the improvement of the river which is utilized to its utmost possibilities.

With the completion of both these improvements we will be in a position to converge the influence of our State on the development of the proposed New Jersey to Baltimore ocean to bay waterway.

BOOTH TARKINGTON ANSWERS KIPLING

American Novelist Points to Inconsistency of Britisher's Attack

New York, Sept. 14.—Booth Tarkington replies as follows, in part, to the charges of Rudyard Kipling, made through an alleged interview with Clare Sheridan, that America entered the World War too late and now has all the gold.

"Mrs. Sheridan says that Mr. Kipling not long ago spoke to her bitterly of America. She tells us that he said the United States came into the war too late."

"We have often been told rather sketchily that we 'came too late.' We wondered about it. Just when would our coming not have been 'too late'?"

"We quit" at the first opportunity. "We forced the Allies to make peace too soon and prevented them from finishing the war in Berlin. That is, we were too late to begin fighting and too ready to quit."
