DUE HERE FIRST OF YEAR

Praise of General Wood's adminis-tration in the Philippine Islands is contained in a dispatch received today by Dr. J. Norman Henry, president of the General Alumni Society of the Univer-sity of Pennsylvania, from J. W. Zeig-ler, of the class of '86, who has been on a business trip in the islands.

officers of the organization in regard to
General Wood's return to the United

States to take up his duties as the new head of the University of Pennsylvania. The telegram, transmitted from Manulla to Scattle, and sent thence to Dr. Henry, is as follows:

"Just returned from eight-day trip over islands with General Wood.

"The work he is doing here in health, sentential frames and administration frames."

The work he is doing here in health, sanitation, finance and administration is magnificent and of the utmost importance both to the Philippines and America. He is held in the highest esteem by every one here. When you realize the value of the contribution he has made to mobiling a nation and readjusting conditions you will not re-Dr. Henry, discussing General Wood's return today, said:


