THE DRUG RING DIGS IN TO FIGHT OFF EXPOSURE

Elaborate Barricades Are Being Erected to Prevent the Spread of Judge Monaghan's Inquiry

IF JUDGE MONAGHAN'S inquiry into the underground drug traffic is permitted to continue uninterrupted in a normal course it will not end with Philadelphia. It will not end with New York.

Such a survey as is now in its first stages here would in the course of time become national in its scope and its significance, because the nature of inevitable disclosures would be such as to bring the mind of the country to amazed attention and shock members of Congress and the State Legislatures into a belated sense of their responsibilities.

Drug syndicates with political protection are as great a menace to the country's safety as an invading army and a greater danger to public health and morals than the whisky traffic ever was.

Were the inquiry begun in Judge Monaghan's court to end with Philadelphia it would and could do little permanent good. Even if the work of Judges and the District Attorney were adequate to eliminate drug peddlers from this community the central problem would remain and the ugly business would be resumed after a short time.

The great value of Judge Monaghan's crusade lies, therefore, in its importance as a direct and intelligent approach to very much larger tasks. It can be at best a beginning, not an end.

Drugs would inevitably flow in from unregulated and unprobed areas. We should be in the position of a prohibition town in the midst of a thoroughly wet country.

THE REVIVAL OF ISLAM

ALLENBY'S sweep over the plain of Armageddon, the Austrian onrush at Caporetto and the stupendous recovery of the Italian forces at Vittorio Veneto are the only engagements of the World War comparable in character with the Turkish stampede of the Greeks in Asia Minor.

Not only is the Greek campaign utterly wrecked, but the new Ottoman ascendancy presages a revival of the pride and ambitions of Islam extending far beyond the region in which the present conflict has been localized.

The French with their vast Mohammedan possessions in equatorial Africa, Senegal and along the south shore of the Mediterranean, are now in a position to pose as guardians of the Islamic tradition and protectors of the historical heirs of the pretensions of the old Caliphate.

Such an attitude accords consistently with the deliberately conceived French policy of sympathy and respect for the dominant religion and social structure of the chief foreign possessions of the republic.

Early in the World War the British Government on the other hand played the game of partition and of dissension between Arab and Turk.

As a result of these cross purposes, the French are unlikely to be alarmed by reports of jubilation in Algiers, Tunis or Dakar, although the reawakened Ottoman designs upon Constantinople are giving the Paris Government cause for some anxiety.

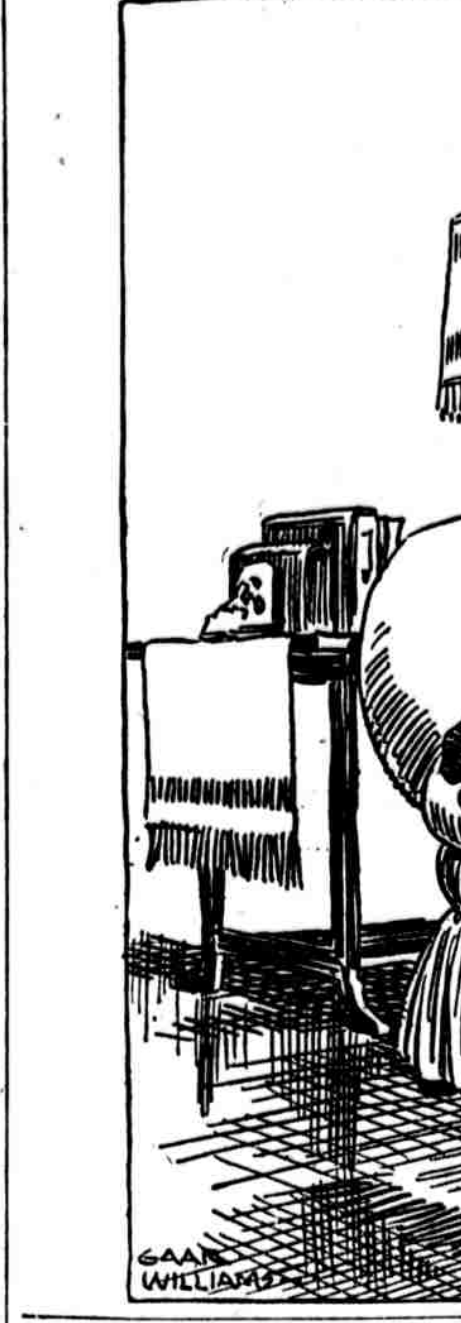
